

SVSC RECEIVES KLECTRON MICROSCOPE FROM SAGINAW DIVISION

Saginaw Division of General Motors Corporation has donated a Cambridge Mark II electron microscope to SVSC. The equipment was officially transmitted to the college on Thursday, September 19 by Mark McCabe, general manager of Saginaw Division. Accepting on behalf of SVSC were President Jack M. Ryder and Dean of Science, Engineering and Technology Thomas E. Kullgren.

The microscope, which will be installed in the new science building, was originally located in Saginaw Division's metallurgy lab. It is used for high magnification inspection of the surface of materials and can detect flaws that have caused materials to fail.

According to Kullgren, the microscope will be used by the college's mechanical engineering department. He said the equipment also will be shared with the biology department. "Dr. Richard Trdan (associate professor of biology) is very interested in the microscope. He plans to use it in his research on mussels. With the microscope, it is possible to carefully inspect biological specimens that have been highly magnified."

The microscope is equipped with a camera that enables it to photograph the highly magnified materials being examined, Kullgren said.

Kullgren said the equipment, which was dismantled before Saginaw Division transported it to the college, will be reassembled and installed in a room specially designed for housing electron microscopes. President Ryder noted that college officials were "extremely grateful" for the donation. "We did not have equipment for the electron microscopy room in our new building, and this contribution is a significant addition that will be used by both students and faculty for research and classroom instruction."

The science building is part of a \$28 million classroom/office/library complex being constructed at SVSC. The science building is expected to be the first subunit completed.

AREA ATHLETE TO TRAIN IN CARDINAL RUN

Almost all athletes who participate in competitive events have experienced the proverbial "agony of defeat." Jim Green can take this feeling one step further.

He can describe the "agony of 'de hands.'"

Green, a 29 year old life-long Saginaw resident, has competed in some 30 road races since 1983--all in the wheelchair division. When preparing for a race, Green not only uses gloves to protect his hands, but he also tapes all of his fingers to prevent blisters. In addition, he wraps his biceps to avoid getting burns from the tires on his custom racing wheelchair.


"I raced in the Detroit Free Press 26-mile marathon last fall," Green said, "and after a while my arms started to cramp up and my shoulders started to burn. When that happens you lose your grip [on the wheels]."

In the marathon, Green placed 20th out of 75 finishers in his division. He also has raced in the Bobby Crim Race for Special Olympics during the last two years, the Emily Midas Race in Detroit, and the Saginaw St. Mary's Hospital Run for Life. Green has won his division in the St. Mary's Run for two consecutive years.

Green, a junior business major at SVSC, is looking for training opportunities on a track. "All of my races have been on the road," he said. "I'm interested in competing in the National Wheelchair Games in 1986, so I'll need some track racing experience."

His first training workout will take place on the SVSC Morley Field track at the fifth annual Cardinal Run. The Cardinal Run, a fund-raising and fun oriented run-walk-jog (and wheel) event, will be Saturday, October 5, beginning at 9:00 a.m. The event is open to all school clubs and teams, service clubs, church groups or any non-profit organizations interested in raising funds for their programs.

Green, while accomplishing his track training experience, will be raising money for the SVSC Abler's Club, an organization designed to provide on-campus assistance to students who have special physical needs. As a participant in the Cardinal Run, Green will solicit pledges for the laps he



completes around Morley Field's 400-meter track. All of the money raised will be collected by the SVSC Foundation after the race. When pledges have been collected, Green's organization will receive 50 percent of the amount, and the remaining 50 percent will provide support for SVSC athletics.

Green said he can cover a mile during a distance race in an average time of 5:30. In a mile sprint, he can wheel in at a 4:30 clip. The biggest difference in track racing versus road racing is that the front wheels are loosened up to accommodate the curves on an oval-shaped track. Also, there are no hills to combat.

"I went out of control on a hill in Traverse City," Green recalled. "I got it back at the bottom of the hill and didn't crash. That was the steepest hill I've ever been on, and I had to be going about 40 miles per hour when I lost it.

"That was too fast. It was pretty scary."
