

The program will explore American music from the colonial period to the present, featuring two major works for woodwind quintet: the well-known Summer Music of neoromantic composer Samuel Barber, and the demanding neoclassical Quintet of Walter Piston. BIDI RECEIVES EDA GRANT FOR TECHNOLOGY TRANSFER

Dr. Leonard Herk, director of the Business and Industrial Development Institute (BIDI) at SVSC, has received a boost for a BIDI project designed to aid the local economy. Herk recently was informed by U. S. Representative J. Robert Traxler's office that the Economic Development Administration (EDA) of the U.S. Department of Commerce has awarded a \$50,000 grant for partial funding of BIDI's Dormant Technology Transfer Project.

The Project is a special effort to accomplish the transfer of surplus, unused technologies from U.S. corporations to small regional businesses, with an ultimate goal of expanding and diversifying the local economic base. Herk introduced the concept to the Saginaw Valley after his arrival two years ago, and has devoted considerable energy to identifying corporations with available technologies and to setting up a framework to accomplish the transfer of processes suited to local use.

"The EDA is especially interested in SVSC's Dormant Technology Transfer Project because the concept had never been practiced on a college campus until proposed by SVSC," Herk said. "The federal government is particularly enthusiastic about this project because they can see it being duplicated on other campuses across the U.S. once the idea has been refined at SVSC."

The EDA grant, which will be funded for a 12 month period beginning immediately, was the result of a Technical Assistance application. Grant money will be used to identify sources and users of available technology, to prepare prospectuses and evaluations of placeable technology, and to test prototype products when needed. The funding also will enable potential users to develop improved versions of prototype products, as well as researching and developing markets for the products.

Saginaw City Councilman Louis Oates cited Thomas Jefferson's statement to explain the involvement of foreign nations in South Africa. He challenged today's students to examine the issues surrounding Apartheid, make a decision and act upon it. He said their stance should be determined "with full realization of the economic realities of that decision. What are you willing to give up?" Oates spoke to a noon-hour SVSC audience on September 25.

HIGH FIVE

The Cardinal **football** team completely dominated previously-undefeated Hillsdale College 28-17 in the GLIAC opener for both teams. The final margin could have been even wider had it not been for six turnovers. The victory was the 13th consecutive conference decision for the defending champs. It also kept coach George Ihler's record unblemished in career GLIAC games. Saginaw Valley had a total of 510 yards offense while Hillsdale netted 315. Tony Jones was the leading rusher with 164 yards while Brian Krukowski gained 147 more. Krukowski's two touchdowns moved him into second place on the all-time SVSC scoring list with 136 points, and he needs only 14 points to pass leader John Waters. This Saturday, Saginaw Valley will entertain Michigan Tech in a 1:30 p.m. homecoming contest. The game will be carried on WBCM (AM 1440) starting at 1:15.

The **cross-country** team finished second in a close race at Saturday's Ferris State Invitational. Friday, SVSC travels to the Notre Dame Invitational.

The **women's tennis** team split a pair of matches over the weekend, winning Saturday at Oakland University after losing Friday at Wayne State.

SVSC's **soccer** club defeated Ferris State, 3-2, over the weekend. The win raised the Cardinal's record to 2-2. The next home match will be October 12 against G.M.I.
