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FALL THEATRE PRODUCTION SCHEDULED NOVEMBER 1-3

The emotional trauma of a group of strangers being held against their will is the subject of SVSC's fall play. "When You Comin Back, Red Ryder?" will premiere November 1, 2 and 3 at the theatre.

"WHEN YOU COMIN BACK, RED RYDER?"

Director Janet E. Rubin selected this play "because it is an O.B.I.E. award winner, Mark Medoff is a very significant American playwright, and the play is a good example of an ensemble acting piece."

The O.B.I.E. is the off-broadway equivalent to the Tony or Oscar awards. "It's a very prestigious award, showing that the play is of sound merit," Rubin explained. "Also, one of our obligations is to train the people in the acting program, and this play provides a number of different challenges.

"The idea of ensemble acting is an important one in the theatre," Rubin continued. "There are roles in this show that will improve the range that each of the actors is able to handle because each performer must maintain intensity for nearly the length of the show."

The plot centers around a group of strangers that are being held hostage in a diner. This experience forces each person to come to terms with his or her own value system.

During the ordeal, they are required to deal with intimidation, fear and their response to relationships with the others.

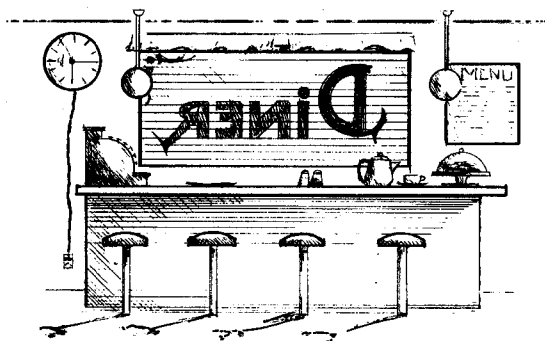
"When You Comin Back, Red Ryder" was first presented by the Circle Repertory Theatre Company in New York City, in November, 1973. The time of action is the end of the 1960s, and it is set in a diner in Southern New Mexico.

Portraying the roles in the play are Frank Foley,

Ric Roberts, Bill Jones, Michael Martin, Kirsten Smitley, Lynn Gruszynski, Mary Kaye Bluhm, and Ann Marie Vozniak. Carolyn Schaeffer is the assistant director/stage manager for the production.

The first two shows, November 1 and 2, will begin at 8:00 p.m. On Sunday, November 3, the play will begin at 2:00 p.m. Rubin said some scenes in the play contain powerful adult drama that may not be appropriate for all age levels.

SVSC RECEIVES GRANT TO SUPPORT BILINGUAL EDUCATION

While a forecast teacher shortage hasn't yet materialized in many fields, it's already a reality in some specialized areas. SVSC has been awarded a U.S. Department of Education grant that will help to alleviate a current undersupply of teachers in one of those areas.

School officials have been informed they will receive a grant of \$149,213 for support of bilingual education in Spanish. Announcement of the award came from Dr. Ralph K. Coppola, director of sponsored programs at SVSC.

"The standard state recommended ratio for children with special needs is one teacher to 15 students," Coppola said. "Currently in the Saginaw Valley the Hispanic 'Limited English Proficiency' (LEP) student-to-teacher ratio is one teacher to 202 students."

Coppola explained that sections 380-1151-1158 of the School Code of 1976 require school districts to provide full-time bilingual instruction for LEP students. "When additional bilingually endorsed teachers are prepared for service and placed in unfilled jobs in the Saginaw Valley, school districts will be able to comply with state law," he said.

"More important, proper education will be possible for the large and expanding population of LEP students and migrant children in the area."

Another benefit that Coppola sees resulting from the grant is economic. "Many of the teachers prepared through this program are expected to be from historically under-represented groups. They will have an opportunity to obtain employment and thus directly and indirectly impact on the financial and unemployment problems in the area."

The largest share of the grant money, nearly \$96,000, will be used for tuition, books and stipends for students who enroll in SVSC's Bilingual Education Program. The award also will be used to hire a counselor and secretary for the program. By completing 24 credit hours of required courses in Spanish, education, history and sociology, certified elementary and secondary teachers can qualify to receive a state endorsement as bilingual teachers in Spanish. "Taking Your Concept from Mind to Market" is the focus of an upcoming conference sponsored by the Business and Industrial Development Institute on Wednesday, November 20, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., in lower level Doan Center.

Primary purposes of the conference are to introduce participants to the many facets of the invention process and to the steps taken to organize thoughts into a well conceived plan of action.

In addition, the legal considerations of obtaining a patent will be examined and help will be available for the marketing stage, with tips and tactics on how best to commercialize a product.

Conference sessions include: "Inventions Make Life Worth Living," presented by Edgar D. Young, inventor and innovator and keynote speaker for National Innovation Workshops; "Market Research and Strategy," presented by C. Merle Crawford, University of Michigan Professor of Marketing; and "How to Get a Patent and What It Will Do For You," presented by Ann Arbor Patent Attorney James Deimen.

Luncheon and guest speaker will be James VanderKelen, president of Snow Machines, Inc. in Midland.

PROCEDURES OUTLINED FOR FACILITIES SCHEDULING

All SVSC individuals and organizations planning to use campus facilities should consider the following suggestions before scheduling future events:

Schedule well in advance. Contact the Facility Scheduling office to determine if the desired day, time and facility will be available. Consider second and third choices if your first choice is taken. Do not advertise the event until receiving the signed facility scheduling forms. If food service or a special set up is required, schedule at least two weeks prior to the event. It is important that menu and set up are detailed on the forms. An account number (scheduling group's or Conference Bureau's) is required for all activities requesting food service. If you have not received the signed scheduling forms one week prior to the event, call the Facility Scheduling office to check on them.

Moving the football proved difficult for the Cardinal **football** team on Saturday as Northern Michigan University claimed a 20-0 homecoming win over the Cards in a nonleague contest. Northern held SVSC, which had been averaging 416.3 offensive yards per game, to 258 total yards. Northern, ranked 16th in NCAA Division II polls, now is 5-2, while SVSC drops to 2-4-1 overall. NMU scored two touchdowns in the first quarter, one on its first possession and later on a one-yard run. After that, the Wildcat's defensive unit took control. SVSC's deepest penetration was to the NMU 17-yard line, but on fourth and two quarterback Mike Leibinger was stopped short of the first down on a keeper. SVSC managed to reach the NMU 20 at one point in the second half, but a turnover ended the drive. SVSC fullback Tony Jones led the Cardinals with 89 yards on 18 carries. Tailback Bryon Krukowski was held to just 33 yards in nine carries. Leibinger completed 8 of 17 for 81 yards and was sacked three times. The Cardinals will return to conference action this Saturday when Wayne State University invades Cardinal Stadium. Kick-off time is 1:30 p.m. The game will be carried live on WBCM Radio (1440 AM) beginning at 1:15.

Robert Lemuel was SVSC's top finisher at the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference **Cross Country** Championships held at Oakland University on Saturday. Lemuel's 32:21 time placed him fourth. Rick Genson was sixth with a 32:31 time. Overall, SVSC placed third behind champion Ferris State and second-place finisher Hillsdale.

SAGINAW VALLEY STATE COLLEGE MISSION STATEMENT

Saginaw Valley State College was founded in 1963 primarily to meet higher education needs in east-central Michigan. The College offers a comprehensive array of traditional baccalaureate degrees. The same general education requirements support all of the undergraduate curricula. Master's degrees also are granted in fields for which there is substantial regional demand.

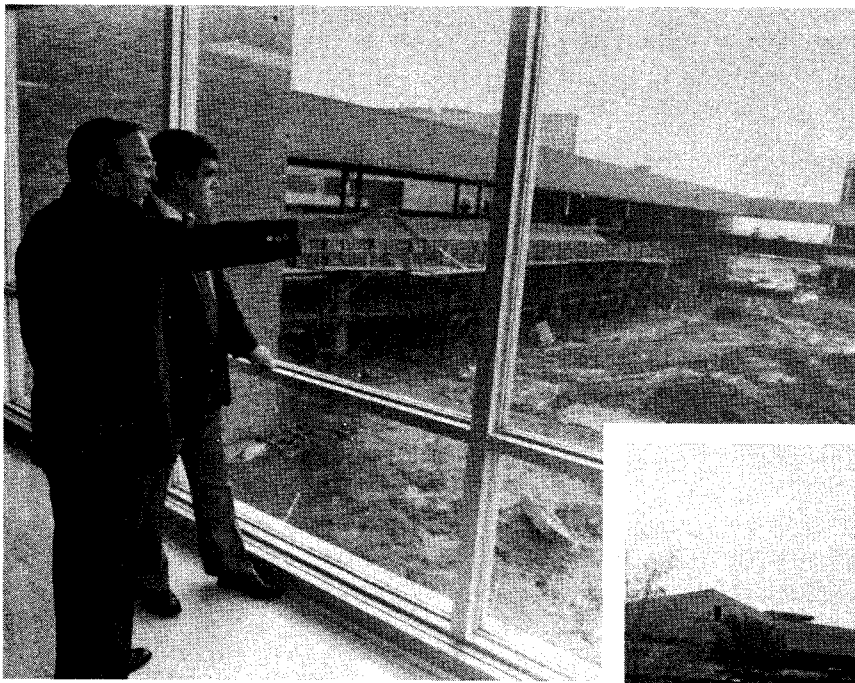
Approximately one-half of SVSC's students are in the traditional age range; the others are older students, most of whom are preparing for occupational advancement or leadership roles in their community. Nearly ninety percent of all students are commuters; many combine part-time study with full-time or part-time employment. The resident students live in convenient apartment-like dormitory suites or housekeeping apartments.

The primary mission of SVSC is to promote the intellectual and personal growth of students. A highly-qualified faculty, most of whom hold terminal degrees, teach in both day and evening classes. Classes are designed to be relatively small. Support services and cocurricular offerings are planned to meet the needs of both residential and commuting students. Periodic program review is used to monitor the quality and the impact of formal and informal learning opportunities.

As an important part of its mission, the College fosters research and creative activities. The goals of the research program are to extend knowledge, inspire superior teaching, and contribute to the intellectual life and social well-being of the region.

Community service is another element of the College mission. SVSC sponsors continuing education courses, conferences, workshops and technology transfer efforts. Cultural events, many campus activities and the College library are open to the public. The library serves as the administrative center of a regional consortium formed to encourage resource-sharing. SVSC faculty and staff cooperate with area businesses and civic organizations in ways that contribute to the economic and cultural vitality of the region.

Two commitments are common to the instructional, research and community service components of the College mission. First, SVSC actively cooperates with area community colleges to assure broad access to education and efficient use of resources. Second, SVSC is dedicated to helping students and area citizens acquire the knowledge and skills they need to function effectively in the increasingly interdependent nations of the world.
