YUN RECEIVES NSF GRANT

SVSC professor of physics Dr. S. K. "Tom" Yun has done extensive research into theories that explain the creation of the universe.

His work has received world-wide attention, and his papers have been published in numerous scientific journals.

Recently Yun received a research grant from the National Science Foundation to support his work in theoretical high energy physics.

The \$6,000 award was effective October 15 and extends through March 31, 1987. Yun plans to use the funds to "supersymmetrize" his theory of "multigenerational grand unification."

"The theory attempts to reveal the origin of the replication of family structure of quarks and leptons," Yun said. (Quarks and leptons are building blocks of matter.)

"My theory explains why these particles come in three families in terms of a generation group. New particles, such as the second neutral vector boson, are predicted by this theory. Their masses and properties also are calculated.

"My project also will investigate other phenomenological consequences (of matter formation) so that they can be compared with other experiments."

Yun, chairperson of the SVSC physics department, regularly spends summers conferring with colleagues at Harvard and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has contributed more than 20 articles to national and international scholarly journals and has published three books.

The award is the first research grant to be received by SVSC from NSF. According to Sponsored Programs Director Ralph Coppola, competition for NSF grants is intense, and few are awarded to small colleges. "Dr. Yun's reputation in theoretical high energy physics was a significant factor in obtaining this grant," Coppola said.

FERGUSON NAMED AS AFFIRMATIVE ACTION OFFICER

Amy C. Ferguson has been named Affirmative Action Officer for the college, replacing Angelita Torrez. The appointment was effective October 1. Earlier, Ferguson was named assistant director of SVSC's Business and Industrial Development Institute.

She came to SVSC in 1981 as administrative secretary in the Office of Sponsored Programs. In 1982 she was appointed coordinator for BIDI. Prior to her employment here, Ferguson was a research assistant with Millette and Associates, personnel consultants in Cincinnati, Ohio. Other employment assignments were with Gibson Greeting Cards and with the public library system in Cincinnati.

James P. Dwyer has been promoted from admissions counselor to assistant director of admissions. Prior to his employment with SVSC's Admissions Office in 1979, Dwyer taught at Bay City All Saints High School, and served as head basketball coach for Saginaw St. Stephen's. He received a B.A. in history in 1976 and an M.A.T. in education in 1985. Both degrees were earned from SVSC.

SVSC SEEKS INPUT ON CAMPUS MINISTRY PROGRAM

For the past thirteen years, students at SVSC have been able to examine theological, religious and philosophical issues with the guidance of a Campus Ministry staff. While funding for the program came through the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saginaw, there was a decidedly ecumenical emphasis on its activities.

"The program has been warmly received by students of varying religious denominations. It has provided personal and communal growth for the entire SVSC community, including faculty, staff and administration," said President Jack M. Ryder.

Recently college officials were notified that the Saginaw Diocese would not be able to fund a program with a campus minister in the future. Current funding will terminate June 30, 1986. "We are certainly familiar with policies of fiscal restraint," Ryder said, "since we have at times suffered from budget cuts. However, we remain grateful to the Diocese for their past support."

Ryder said the Diocesan decision will offer an opportunity to study the various needs and concerns of an ongoing campus ministry program. "We will be able to redesign a model for our SVSC campus."

He formed a study committee that will conduct an assessment of the current role of SVSC's campus ministry program. The committee is charged with identifying how the college's program relates to the quad-county community and to Michigan's public four-year colleges and universities. It will recommend what functions of the ministry should be maintained, expanded, modified or eliminated. To achieve its goals, the committee will conduct forums open to the campus community and will survey faculty, staff and students to seek opinions on the future of the ministry.

The committee also will reach out to the quad-county religious community and establish discussion regarding resources and services that might be available locally. The United Presbyterians have provided some assistance in the past, and the committee hopes to develop a broad base of support.

Membership on the study committee includes students, faculty, administrators and people from the local religious community. An organizational meeting was held October 14. Work is expected to be complete by early spring, with a final report presented by April 3, 1986. A permanent replacement for the transformer destroyed in the April 24 electrical storm and Wickes Annex fire was delivered to campus Tuesday, October 29. Workmen hoisted it into place on the fourth floor of Wickes Hall. Actual hookup into the College's electrical system will be done on Saturday, November 30. The change from the temporary transformer that has been in use since April will take about 8-12 hours, according to Plant Services Director Robert Tutsock. During that time, there will be no power in Wickes Hall. Heat, phone service, and computer operation will be interrupted for that period.

HIGH FIVE

Cardinal football coach George Ihler recorded his first loss in GLIAC play as Ferris State College handed SVSC a 28-21 defeat Saturday. The set-back knocks SVSC out of first place in the conference. To win a third title, the Cards first need to beat Grand Valley in Cardinal Stadium this Saturday, then hope for a Northwood victory over Hillsdale. Grand Valley and Hillsdale are sharing the top spot in the conference race. Saturday's game pitted the league's top passing attack (FSC) against the top-ranked running attack of SVSC. Cardinal tailback Bryon Krukowski finished with 144 yards rushing, and Bulldog quarterback Dave DenBraber passed for 276 yards and two touchdowns. This week's Grand Valley game will be carried live on WBCM Radio (1440 AM) beginning at 1:15 p.m.

The men's cross country team finished second at the NAIA District 23 finals Saturday at Hillsdale, qualifying them for the upcoming Nationals. Robert Lemuel paced the Cards, finishing third overall in a time of 25:25.3, while Rich Genson was 4th at 25:45.2 and Brian Oldenberg 8th at 26:08.

SVSC's soccer club team lost to G.M.I. Saturday, 5-3. The Cardinal kickers (3-5-1) have one game remaining in the season as they take on Northwood this week. "Even with only three wins the season has been a successful one," said coach Robert Braddock, "because we've been competitive all the way."
