DIRECTOR OF BILINGUAL EDUCATION APPOINTED

Dr. Jose Luis Valderas has been named Director of Bilingual Education. He will supervise the operation of SVSC's Bilingual-Bicultural Center and manage a \$149,213 U.S. Department of Education grant supporting a bilingual (Spanish/English) teacher training program.

The largest portion of the grant, \$96,000, will be used for tuition, books and stipends for 45 students who enroll in SVSC's bilingual education program. According to Valderas, three categories of students will be eligible to receive financial assistance through the program.

"We expect to enroll approximately equal numbers of currently certified elementary and secondary teachers who wish to obtain a state-approved bilingual endorsement, undergraduate full-time, and undergraduate part-time students," Valderas said. "Our candidates will come from the ranks of those who already are enrolled in the SVSC School of Education program or new students who are just beginning an education major.

"Program students must meet stiff academic and programmatic requirements to qualify for future grant awards. Students are expected to sign a commitment form that specifies an intent to work as bilingual teachers after the baccalaureate degree or completing endorsement program." He added that language proficiency in Spanish and English will be "Standardized testing instruments assessed. will be used for the assessment," Valderas said. He noted that there is a shortage of bilingually certified teachers in the Saginaw Valley, which he said has the largest concentration of 'Limited English Proficiency' (LEP) and Hispanic students in the state. Ms. Milagro S. Arenas of Saginaw has been Education Center hired as the Bilingual secretary. She previously served as secreSACONAL VIOLENTE CA

tary in the Chicano/Latino Services Office at Delta College. Valderas also expects to hire a bilingual counselor for the Center.

The Center directorship marks a homecoming for Valderas, who was employed at SVSC from 1974 to 1979. He first served as Coordinator of the Learning Center and Liaison for Financial Aid. From 1976 to 1979 he held the position of Coordinator of Academic Advisement.

Since 1979 Valderas has served in various capacities with the Title VII Mid-Michigan Bilingual Program in Buena Vista School District, Carrollton Public Schools, and Bay City Public Schools. Many of his duties involved work with Title VII bilingual teacher aides and students, and monitoring of a K-6 microcomputer elementary curriculum in eight school sites.

Valderas holds a B.A. degree from Western Michigan University and a M.A. in Spanish and linguistics from the University of New He recently completed all require-Mexico. of Education degree ments for a Doctor through Wayne State University. He received a Title VII Bilingual Doctoral Fellowship from the U.S. Office of Education from 1980 to 1983. His community memberships include Bay City League of United Latin American Citizens (president), St. Boniface Church Education Commission, National Association for Bilingual Education, Bay City's "Morning" Optimist Club, and the Bay Chapter of the American G.I. Forum.

FINE ARTS BUILDING CAMPAIGN DRAWS SUPPORT

SVSC's campaign to complete a major fund raising effort for a new fine arts facility gained momentum as 1985 ended. Although final figures will be delayed until all holiday mail is processed, the project already has received some \$6.65 million in contributions and pledges toward the estimated cost of \$7 million.

Efforts to raise private contributions for the facility have been under way for more than a year. On December 9, 1985, with more than \$6 million already in hand, the campaign was publicly announced. College officials hoped to reach the campaign goal by December 31 so they could claim an anonymous challenge grant of \$250,000.

There was excellent public response to the request, according to President Jack M. Ryder. "There have been numerous gifts since the public became aware of our need. The response has been most gratifying," Ryder said. "People are genuinely interested in helping us secure this facility, which will be available as a community resource."

In addition to many individual gifts, contributions have been received from corporations and foundations, Ryder said. Among the largest contributors were three foundations, including The Dow Chemical Company Foundation (\$250,000), the Gerstacker Foundation (\$150,000), both from Midland; and The Harvey Randall Wickes Foundation (\$250,000) from Saginaw.

Other organizations that have contributed include Chemical Bank of Midland; NBD - Saginaw, Saginaw; the employees of Scientific Brake, Saginaw; Morley Bros. Foundation, Saginaw; Kantzler Foundation, Bay City; Michigan National Bank, Valley Branch, Saginaw; Walbro Charitable Trust, Cass City; Newhouse Foundation, Booth Newspapers of Bay City and Saginaw; Saginaw Bay Underwriters, Saginaw and Bay City; Michigan Sugar Company, Saginaw; and Ernst & Whinney, Saginaw.

Local legislators also got into the act, presenting personal checks to Ryder for use in the project. "The project was approved by State authorities prior to development of building plans," Ryder said, adding that operating funds for the building will come from State revenues. "We were extremely pleased to have area legislators add their personal involvement to the legislative

support they had previously accorded the project."

SVSC employees also are supporting the drive with personal contributions, Ryder noted. "They have demonstrated that they are willing to add their financial effort to improve the college environment for the students and the community."

While December contributions of \$625,000 were less than the \$975,000 needed to claim the challenge grant, positive response has convinced the anonymous donor to extend the offer until June 1, 1986. "We feel confident that we will be able to raise the \$350,000 needed to meet our goal," Ryder said. He said efforts would be focused on certain foundations and individuals to secure the remaining pledges needed.

Ryder indicated that enough progress has been made so bids could be sought on the building in late January or early February. "We hope to complete the drive relatively soon. With the bid process complete, we could break ground as early as April or May," he said.

"We are extremely pleased by the outpouring of support for the fine arts project. Such outstanding community response will help SVSC continue its development as an excellent regional college dedicated to serving the people of the Saginaw Valley and northeast Michigan."

NOVICKE TO LEAVE SVSC IN JUNE

"Many people have never even seen a real nun, let alone one who wears blue jeans," said Sister Trish Novicke as she relaxed in her office in the A-basement of Great Lakes Hall. After spending six years as full-time director of the Campus Ministry, Novicke will take on a new role after June 30. "I've been thinking about social work for a long time, and am working on a bachelor's degree here at Saginaw Valley in social work," said Novicke. "I have been in Campus Ministry for 11 years. I love it, but I'm looking forward to the change."

Novicke came to SVSC after spending four years working for Campus Ministry at Creighton University, in Omaha, Nebraska. Duties here as campus minister have included programming, counseling, making referrals to other clergy, and helping other local ministers become present on campus.

"Our Campus Ministry is interfaith," said Novicke. "We welcome any religion, and people with no religious background are welcome as well. We try to expose students to what they will see and encounter in the real world, and help them become adults in their faith." Programs Novicke has involved students in include "chat-abouts," where students come and raise questions on sexual concerns, drugs, alcohol and relationships.

"The faculty on this campus take advantage of what is here as well," commented Novicke. "I

help them with questions, concerns; some have come to me for materials when conducting research." Novicke added that although most services and activities offered have not changed much in the past six years, there has not been as much emphasis on projects programming this year because of changes taking place concurrent with Novicke's departure.

College officials were notified in the fall that the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saginaw, which had funded the campus minister in the past, would not be able to continue full funding after June, 1986. President Ryder has formed a committee to conduct an assessment of the current role of the Campus Ministry Program, to gain information on redesigning a model for the campus. "My decision to leave here was not based on the Diocesan decision," said Novicke. "As I said earlier, I want to be practicing social work, or go to graduate school in the fall for further studies in social work if the money is available.

"The committee is looking at a number of options, and I'm optimistic that they will come up with a whole new 'animal' to be just as effective as the past programs. I think all of this has come at a good time, a change in program as well as personnel, rather than just changing one part."

Committee chairman Dr. Gary Davis said that the original committee has now broken down into three smaller committees. According to Davis, the Survey Committee was in charge of organizing, circulating, then analyzing a survey designed to aid in defining the goals of a Campus Ministry Program, and how it could be implemented while meeting the participants' needs. The Resource Committee is concentrating on finding resources for the future, while the Program Committee is responsible for deciding what the Campus Ministry should do.

"The Program Committee has already made a couple of recommendations," said Davis, "and it looks now like we are leaning toward a chaplaincy." Davis explained that the emphasis would be on a chaplain spending time with an individual and his or her needs. "We have found that this method is successful on campuses composed largely of commuters," said Davis. "We would appreciate any feedback on how people feel this might work on our campus." Responses or questions may be directed to Davis in the President's Office.

In early November, President Ryder appointed an Enrollment Control Study Committee to evaluate enrollment patterns at SVSC. The Committee will study issues on admission standards, impact of tuition and fee policies, recruiting of students, and the advisability of limiting student enrollment.
