

RENNA RECEIVES FIRST EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH AWARD



SVSC professor of history Dr. Thomas J. Renna, 48, has been named recipient of the Award for Excellence in Research.

The award was established to recognize individual faculty who present work of the highest quality over an

extended period of time. The initial selection committee was chaired by Dr. Robert Yien, vice president of academic affairs. Included on the committee were the academic deans, Dr. William K. Barnett, arts and behavioral sciences; Dr. James Mitchell, business and management; Dr. Guy Lee, education; Dr. Crystal Lange, nursing and allied health; and Dr. Thomas Kullgren, science, engineering and technology.

According to Dr. Yien, future selection committees will include one academic administrator as chairperson elect, the previous year's recipient of the award, a member of the Board of Fellows, and individuals from the community who are prominent in various fields of research conducted in the college.

In announcing the selection, President Ryder noted that he was "pleased to have Dr. Thomas Renna named Saginaw Valley State College's first recipient of the Award for Excellence

President Ryder will deliver his "State of the College" address at 12:30 p.m. in lower level Doan Center on Friday, February 7. It is open to the campus community. in Research." Ryder added, "Dr. Renna's outstanding scholarly performance since his arrival at SVSC in 1970 clearly merits recognition."

Renna's list of scholarly accomplishments include authoring two books, titled "Church and State in Medieval Europe 1050-1314" and "The West in the Early Middle Ages." Currently, Renna is working on a third book, "The Jerusalem Connection," pertaining to the idea of Medieval thought in the modern Middle East. He has had seven invited articles included in the "Dictionary of The Middle Ages." His five pamphlets have been published by New Mellerary Abbey, and some thirty scholarly articles have been used in refereed journals, including "Speculum," "Citeaux," "Augustinian Studies," "Cistercian Studies," "Studia Monastica," and the "Michigan Academician."

Renna has had more than 35 papers read at professional society meetings all over the United States. Many were by invitation, including one in Isreal. His work has been assisted with external funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) on two occasions, and also twice from the American Philosophical Society. Other awards presented to Renna include the Distinguished Faculty Member, sponsored by the Michigan Association of Governing Boards; and Outstanding Scholar, 1983, by the Michigan Academy of Arts, Sciences and Letters. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. Renna has been recognized by his peers at SVSC, evidenced by an SVSC Merit Award in 1977 and ten research grant awards. In 1984 he was presented the Landee Award for Excellence in Teaching, SVSC's highest honor bestowed on outstanding educators.

Recipients of the Award for Excellence in Research receive an engraved plaque, a cash award, and recognition at commencement exercises held in May.

SVSC TO HONOR OUTSTANDING KDUCATOR

Nominations are being sought for SVSC's top faculty honor, the Franc A. Landee Award for excellence in Teaching. The annual award is presented to a professor who demonstrates knowledge of subject superior prepares students academically, displays sincerity and relates classroom learning to real life. Other criteria for the award include ability to motivate students. sensitivity towards their opinions, fairness and integrity, maintenance of high standards for academic achievement, and a demonstrated interest in counseling and advising students.

Selection committee chairman Dr. Guy M. Lee, Jr., dean of the school of education, said nominations are very important to the process of selecting an award winner. "The committee reviews each ballot return for its quality of expressed reasons of choice," Lee said, adding "I emphasize that this activity is not a popularity contest based on the quantity of ballots received."

This year 104 faculty members are eligible for nomination. Ballots are available from Lee and at the SVSC Student Government office. Completed ballots should be returned to Lee, postmarked by March 1, 1986. Selection committee deliberations will begin on March 21. The Landee Award recipient will be announced at a luncheon on April 15, and then honored during commencement exercises in May. faculty member selected receives a special plaque, \$1000, and other honors. Franc A. Landee was a research chemist at Dow Chemical Company who also taught part time at In 1968, a memorial fund was established to give recognition each year to an outstanding educator.


