SVSC PRESENTS SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING OPEN HOUSE

A preview of new science facilities and a slide/movie program by a NASA astronaut will highlight a Science and Engineering Open House, sponsored by the School of Science, Engineering and Technology. Everyone from the campus community is invited to attend the Thursday, April 10 open house.

Activities will begin at 6:00 p.m. in Pioneer Those attending will be given a tour of a new \$10 million science building, which represents the first of three new instructional facilities at the college to be completed. Guests also will have opportunities to watch live science and engineering demonstrations. At 7:30 in the SVSC theatre. Colonel Fred Gregory, space shuttle pilot, will show and narrate movies of his April 1985 mission in space.

Upon graduating from the United States Air Force Academy in 1964, Gregory, 45, entered pilot training and received his wings after undergraduate helicopter training in 1965. Following three years of helicopter flying he was re-trained as a fighter pilot and flew the F-4 Phantom. He attended the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School in 1970 and was subsequently assigned as a research/engineering test pilot for the Air Force from 1971 until 1974, and for NASA from 1974 until 1978. He has flown more than 40 different types of single and multi-engine fixed and rotary wing military and civilian aircraft, including He has logged over 5,300 hours gliders. flight time and holds an FAA commercial and instrument certificate for single- and multiairplanes and helicopters. addition, Gregory has authored or co-authored several papers in the areas of aircraft handling qualities and flight controllers.

Selected as an astronaut candidate by NASA in January 1978, Gregory completed a one-year

training and evaluation period in August 1979. He was the pilot on STS 51-B, the Spacelab 3 (SL-3) mission. The Space Shuttle Challenger was launched from Kennedy Space Center, Florida, on April 29, and landed 110 earth orbits later, on May 6, 1985, at Edwards Air Force Base, California. Gregory presently is assigned technical duties within the Astronaut Office while awaiting another flight assignment.

Gregory received a B.S. degree from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1964, and a M.A. degree in Information Systems from George Washington University in 1977. His professional memberships include the Society of Experimental Test Pilots, American Helicopter Society, Air Force Academy Association of Graduates. Air Force Association, Sigma Pi Phi, National Technical Association, and the Tuskegee Airmen. Special honors received include the Air Force Distinguished Flying Cross, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Air Medal with 15 Oak Leaf Clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal, and the NASA Space Flight Medal. He also is recipient of the National Society of Black Engineers Distinguished National Scientist Award (1979). He is married and has two college-age children. During his free time, he enjoys water and snow skiing.

RUBIN, AUSTRALIAN PROFESSOR TO EXCHANGE

Dr. Janet Rubin, associate professor of communication/theatre, will escape the icy winds of Saginaw Valley next winter. She will be teaching at Ballarat College of Advanced Education in Ballarat Victoria, Australia during winter semester 1987.

Rubin becomes the first SVSC faculty member to participate in a teaching exchange arranged through the Faculty Exchange Center (FEC), a national program that facilitates the interchange of professional educators. The Center makes it possible for interested professors to exchange positions with colleagues in their field where the language of instruction is English.

While Rubin is instructing students at Ballarat College, her classes here will be taught by Professor Bruce Widdop from Ballarat. The instructors will remain on the payroll of their respective institutions, but will exchange teaching loads. They also will trade housing for the semester.

According to Dr. Gene Hamilton, dean of continuing education and international programs, the Rubin/Widdop exchange is especially exciting because they share areas of expertise. "Widdop's specialty is children's theatre," he said, "and Janet also developed innovative programs in children's theatre. They will be able to enrich programs at both institutions by sharing ideas."

Hamilton said that 10 SVSC faculty currently are listed with FEC, but indicated that the directory of institutions and professors interested in exchange is available to anyone. Those interested in exploring exchange opportunities should contact his office at extension 4068.

LECTURE SET ON SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION

There are five distinct rapist personalities and most sexual assaults follow a sequence, according to Stephen M. Thompson. He has researched the topic extensively since 1971 when one of his martial arts students at Indiana University became a rape victim.

Based on his research, Thompson has developed the "Option System of Sexual Assault Prevention." The system teaches women what they can do at each stage of a potential rape situation. He claims that graduates of his program who were involved in verifiable assault situations report a 90 percent success rate in escaping their assailants.

Thompson teaches sexual assault classes at Central Michigan University. He has made over 45 television and radio appearances, numerous presentations, and has authored two books. He will lecture at SVSC on Wednesday, April 2 at 7:00 p.m. in lower level Doan Center. Admission is free.

SVSC HONOR SOCIETY WINS AWARDS

One of SVSC's newest honor societies is off to an excellent start. Last year the Iota Epsilon chapter of Alpha Phi Sigma national criminal justice honor society was initiated here through the efforts of Dr. Charles B. Fields, who was selected faculty advisor. In March he and four student members, Rod Charles, Alan Izykowski, Tom Spokaeski and Mark Vivio, attended the annual meeting of the society, held in conjunction with the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences conference. The chapter was awarded a plaque and \$50 in recognition of being named "Outstanding New Chapter of 1985-86." They received a second plaque for having the most new members of any chapter. According to Dr. Fields, there are 106 chapters; SVSC was the 101st to be chartered, and seven new chapters were established this year.

HIGH FIVE

- --Alma College continued to give the SVSC baseball team fits, splitting a doubleheader with the Cardinals Saturday. Alma snapped SVSC's six-game winning streak with a 5-1 win in the first game, spoiling the Cardinals' "home" opener. The game was played at the Saginaw Township diamond in front of nearly 200 fans. SVSC exploded in the second game, collecting 12 hits in a 9-3 victory. Garth Brittenham had two hits, including a double and an RBI, while claiming the victory with seven strong innings on the mound. SVSC closed its best March ever with a 14-4 mark.
- --The Cardinal softball team took on an impressive list of opponents on its western spring trip and brought back a 5-5 record under new head coach Art Tolfree. SVSC faced four NCAA Division I teams on the trip, earning a victory against the host school in the University of Hawaii Tournament. The Cards almost knocked off nationally-ranked Utah State, losing 1-0 on an unearned run in the opening game of the tournament.
- --A slow start by the Cardinal golf team snowballed into a fast finish as they capped a successful spring trip. Cardinal senior transfer Tom Ham turned in a 71 round on Thursday, to finish second low medalist in the Carson-Newman Eagle Invitational. All five Cardinals shot under 80 for the first time in the early season. SVSC finished third in the 15-team field. The Cardinals placed 15th among 22 teams at the Smokey Mountain Invitational earlier last week.
