STATE APPROPRIATIONS SET; SVSC BUDGET ADOPTED

On July 28 Governor James J. Blanchard signed the higher education budget bill for the 1987 fiscal year. The measure continues the momentum of increased state investment, tuition restraint and greater accessibility to college education, according to the Governor. "This bill keeps our higher education system on the front line for Michigan's future," he said. "It provides another significant increase in state support for our fouryear public colleges and universities and permits tuition restraint without sacrificing excellence."

The bill appropriates \$1 billion for higher education, with increases averaging 7.6 percent for each school. It includes \$2.6 million for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Rosa Parks Program that offers scholarships and fellowships to disadvantaged and minority students. The program also provides stipends to minority visiting professors and offers opportunities for teenagers to visit college campuses.

Continued in the bill is the \$25 million Research Excellence Fund proposed by Governor Blanchard and approved by the legislature last year. The fund enables Michigan's higher education system to perform research vital to Michigan's economic future.

The bill allocates \$12,241,601 to SVSC, up from \$10,369,887 last year. The \$1,871,714 increase amounts to 18.05 percent. However, \$1,140,000 of the total increase, or 11 percent, is to be used for operating costs associated with opening I.F. 2. Another \$50,000 is allocated for expanding instructional computing capabilities, and \$71,400 is SVSC's share of the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Rosa Parks fund. When these items are deducted, the actual increase that can be used for general operations amounts to just over 5.9 percent.

"We are very pleased with the support the State has given us and hope that we can continue to make progress toward meeting the needs of our growing enrollment," said President Jack M. Ryder. "The fact that we will be able to open our new buildings and operate them is important."

The 1986-87 budget for the College was approved by the Board of Control on Monday, August 11. (See Board Report for related details.) Because SVSC's fiscal year begins July 1 and the State's fiscal year starts October 1, the \$18,225,290 budget reflects a three month period with a lower level of state funding. Included in the spending plan is \$21,400 for an M.L. King College Day, \$20,000 for M.L. King visiting professorships, and \$30,000 for M.L. King scholarships for master's degree candidates.

* * * MOVE TO SCIENCE BUILDING BEGINS * * *


Nearly everyone is joining in as various science departments start the move to the new Science Building.

BOARD REPORT



A Report of the Saginaw Valley State College Board of Control

August 11, 1986

With action on State higher education appropriations completed, the College administration presented a 1986-87 fiscal year budget to the SVSC Board of Control for approval at its August meeting. The plan calls for \$18,225,290 in revenues and expenditures, compared to the 1985-86 budget of \$15,722,740.

In recommending the budget to the Board, President Jack M. Ryder noted that the administration had "departed from the typical approach" used in prior years to develop SVSC budgets. The first step, Ryder said, was appointment of a budget committee that included Dr. Robert S. P. Yien, Mr. Richard P. Thompson and Mr. Jerry A. Woodcock. The committee was given parameters by the Administrative Council, and, with these guidelines, conducted hearings with various account managers and supervisors. After the hearing process was completed, the committee presented its recommendations to President Ryder before the final budget was prepared.

In presenting the budget for approval, Vice President for Administration and Business Affairs Jerry A. Woodcock told Board members that included in the plan was \$1.5 in "forward funding." He explained that forward funding is a device used to adjust for the difference between the State's fiscal year, which begins October 1, and the college's,

which starts July 1. Through this concept, money allocated for the months of July, August and September are advanced to the schools before June 30. The legislature has indicated that it intends to use forward funding on a long-term basis to assist the colleges with financial planning.

Woodcock answered several questions and distributed a handout detailing differences between SVSC's budget request and the final appropriation. The budget includes, among other items, support for four additional full-time faculty and a career counselor. Following discussion, Board members approved the budget as presented. (See related article on page 1 and reprint of budget on reverse of this page for more detail.)

Board members also gave their approval to a resolution authorizing the College to enter a term loan agreement with Chemical Bank and Trust Company to provide interim financing prior to receipt of pledges for the construction of the Fine Arts Center. Under terms of the agreement, SVSC will borrow \$2,100,000, to be fully repaid by February 1, 1990. Prepayment of principal without penalty is permissible, should funds be available. The loan is necessary, Woodcock explained, because pledges for the Fine Arts Center will be received over a five year period. Loan provisions call for an interest rate of 60%

of the NBD prime rate, and the loan is secured by project pledges and certain other "legally available funds," but contains no lien against State appropriations or general operating funds.

In other action, the Board:

- --adopted a resolution expressing appreciation to the Marshall M. Fredericks family for its gifts to the College and the community.
- --approved a resolution awarding to Dr. Bernyce S. Smith the status of SVSC Professor Emerita.
- --approved the agreement between SVSC and the SVSC Employees' Chapter of Local 933, Michigan Council #25, AFSCME, AFL-CIO covering the period from July 1, 1986 through June 30, 1989.
- --heard a report on the status of international programs at SVSC. Dr. Salas expressed concern that there were no programs with Mexico. Mrs. Jo Saltzman, chairing the meeting in Dr. Gilmore's absence due to illness, requested that Dr. Hamilton return to a future meeting with a response.
- --heard preliminary reports on fall registration, admissions and housing.
- --voted to consider agenda items 9, 10 and 11 at the next Board meeting and adjourned to the Pine Grove Apartments dedication.


BUILDING UPDATE


completed before fall classes begin.

have the price tag attached. Supplies are not returnable.


