MASTER'S PROGRAM GRADUATES RATE SVSC STUDY EXPERIENCE

Each January since 1980, SVSC's Office of Institutional Research and Planning has surveyed alumni who were awarded Master's degrees five to 13 months earlier. The results of the five latest surveys appear in a fall semester publication titled "Quintet."

Half of the graduates who earned Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) degrees between Dec. 1980 and Aug. 1985, or 303 of 606, returned survey forms. Forty-eight of the 112 who earned Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.) degrees responded to the survey.

The survey was supervised by Dr. Ann K. Dickey, director of institutional research and planning. Among her findings are that M.A.T. graduates are primarily over 30 years of age (many are over 40), while M.B.A. graduates tend to be somewhat younger. Most M.B.A. respondents reported ages in the 25-29 or 30-39 year ranges.

Three-fourths of the M.A.T. respondents were women, while a substantial majority of the M.B.A. respondents were men, Dickey said. She also noted that only 4.1% of the M.A.T.s and 4.2% of the M.B.A.s said they belonged to a minority group, but added that the information was optional, so

might be incomplete. She also cautioned that generalizations based on M.B.A. data may be unwise. "The small number of questionnaires received from M.B.A. respondents tends to produce rather volatile results."

Dr. Dickey pointed out that both the M.A.T. and M.B.A. programs are designed for and are attracting working adults. Nearly all were employed at least part-time during their final semester. Following graduation, most M.A.T. recipients were employed as K-12 teachers, although several other occupations were reported. M.B.A. graduates listed varied occupations, both in the private and public sectors, and in service or production areas.

Asked to evaluate their SVSC experience, most seemed to be generally satisfied with the education they received. A higher proportion of M.A.T. respondents said that SVSC contributed much to their intellectual growth, but both M.B.A.s and M.A.T.s said the courses and faculty in their programs provided an experience that led to a high degree of educational growth. More M.A.T. than M.B.A. graduates felt their programs assisted their vocational growth, but this may reflect the narrower focus of occupations held by those in the M.A.T. program. EIGHT SVSC STUDENTS RECEIVE FIRST POLISH STUDIES AWARDS

Eight SVSC students were named the first recipients of the Young Americans of Polish Descent Excellence in Polish Studies Award.

The students received awards of \$75 to \$125 each for enrolling in Polish 112, elementary Polish II.

The \$1,500 annual fund from the Polish-American organization was established to encourage and recognize scholastic achievement and culture at the College.

Recipients were selected on the basis of attaining a final grade of A or B in a prior course relevant to Polish studies. Financial need was not a factor. The recipients were selected by Dr. William Barnett, dean of the school of arts and behavioral sciences, in consultation with a representative of Young Americans of Polish Descent.

The course of enrollment for the award was determined by Barnett and the organization's representative. Students named from SVSC were Ronald Sinicki of Auburn; Julie Rutkowski of Akron; Patrick Pawlak of Bay City; Kara Rogalle of New Boston; Jodi Gardner, Audricka Talbert and Robert Hozeska, all of Saginaw; and Marie Klenke of St. Charles. The awards are to be made on a semester basis as long as funds permit.

NEW W-4S DISTRIBUTED

Personnel of the College received a new W-4 form with their Friday, Dec. 19 check.

The Employee Withholding Allowance Certificate must be filed with the Controller's Office by Oct. 1.

Recently approved changes in the federal income tax regulations require all employees complete the new W-4 form. The new tax act creates significant changes in tax rates and includes stringent penalties for underwithholding.


