LOT C UNDERGOES RENOVATIONS

Motorists now will note more than changes in the campus structures as work continues to renovate Lot C and the Wickes Circle.

According to Zane Rybkowski, director of the department of public safety, the lot will be reserved for handicapped and short-term parking. The 15-minute parking spaces will be eliminated to provide space for building contractors to place vehicles.

Parking meters are being installed in the lot and will permit people to park one-half hour for 25 cents. All money garnered through the meters will return to the parking budget for continued maintenance of all lots.

Rybkowski said the need for parking meters was created due to the number of spaces that would have to be monitored by public safety personnel.

Parking limits will be enforced between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. After 7 p.m., campus visitors may park at no charge until 3 a.m. There is no overnight parking in Lot C.

In addition to Lot C, there also is restricted parking in two rows of Lot D and the portion of Lot A reserved for motor pool and physical plant vehicles.

**LOT D PARKING VIOLATIONS
TO BE INCREASED TO \$10**

Motorists who choose to ignore parking restrictions in D Lot should be prepared to pay a significant increase in fines.

Last year, parking control personnel enforced the reserved section of Lot D by issuing citations in violation of section 9.7r, according to

Lt. Craig Maxwell of the department of public safety.

"Because of the small amount of the fine, many people who did not possess permits for this area continued to park there and accept the \$2 penalty," Maxwell said. "As a result, there were occasions when faculty and staff who possessed valid permits were denied parking space in this reserved section."

Vehicles not displaying permits on their rearview mirrors while parked in the reserved section will receive a citation in violation of section 10.3A, Maxwell said. The fine for the violation is \$10.

"The \$10 fine has acted as a greater deterrent for parking violators in this area," Maxwell said.

VALLEY FILM SOCIETY OPENS 10TH SEASON ON OCT. 2

Fifteen foreign and domestic avant-garde films will be featured during the Valley Film Society's 10th season, debuting Oct. 2 with an American film score. In honor of the 10th anniversary of the VFS, a festival also will take place. Details will be announced later in the season.

"Koyaanisqatsi," the Hopi word for "life out of balance," has no narration or dialogue. The film incorporates a score by Phillip Glass and director G. Reggio's photographic montage of America's landscapes and cityscapes.

All VFS shows are on Friday and open with a series of film shorts at 7:45 p.m., followed by the featured movie at 8 p.m. in SVSC's Theatre. Due to construction in Wickes Hall, the VFS relocated to the Theatre.

The VFS' 1987-88 season includes three American films, three Italian films, two each of African, French and German movies and one apiece of films from South America, Russia and Japan. All foreign films feature English subtitles.

The first foreign feature is the South American film "How Tasty Was My Little Frenchman" on Oct. 16. This black comedy about cannibalism mixes 16th century history, political allegory and an unsettling prophecy.

The Nov. 6 feature, "Red Dust," starring Clark Gable and Jean Harlow, is free to all college students. "Red Dust" is an American tale of the robust romance of an Indochina rubber worker (Gable) and his "floozy gal" (Harlow).

Films are offered in cooperation with SVSC's Campus Activities Office and Student Government.

VFS is a non-profit organization dedicated to bringing classic and contemporary films to the tri-city area. It is operated by volunteers and films are selected by members.

Membership in the VFS is \$20 for 17 admissions (prorated after the first film). Student memberships are \$7.50 for all films. Trial memberships are available for \$5 and entitle the holder to view two films. Membership cards may be picked up at any film screening.
