HONORS PROGRAM GRANT NETS AUTOMOTIVE EXPERT AS SPEAKER

Dr. David E. Cole, professor of engineering and director of the office of the Study of Automotive Transportation at The University of Michigan, is scheduled to present a lecture at 3 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 15, in the Theatre.

Cole's address, "Technology and Change: Restructuring for New Realities," is sponsored by the Honors Program through a grant from the GTE Foundation Lectureship Program.

The \$2,500 grant was awarded to enable the College to examine an issue related to science, technology and human values in order to promote interaction between the campus and the local community.

Dr. Rosalie Riegler Troester, chair of the honors program and associate professor of English, and Dr. Hong Park, professor of economics and a member of the Honors Committee, designed a two-part lecture series centered around the theme, "The Economic and Social Effects of Technological Change."

The second speech will be given March 15 by Dr. Michael Flynn, formerly a professor of sociology at U of M and now with the Industrial Technology Institute in Ann Arbor.

The aim of the lectures is to

examine the political, economic and social environments surrounding new manufacturing technologies and present a framework for reintegrating social values into a less labor-intensive economy.

The lectures are open to the public free of charge. Papers concerning both lectures will be published in the "SVSC Economic and Business Review," edited by Park.

Cole's major efforts in automotive engineering are related both to engines and vehicles. He received his bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees in mechanical engineering from U of M. In addition to his teaching responsibilities in the automotive and thermal sciences area, Cole is known for his research on automotive power plants and overall automotive industry trends.

Cole's recent research focuses on strategic issues relating to the competitiveness of U.S. industry in the international environment. He is active in the Society of Automotive Engineers, currently as a member of the board of directors and previously as chairman of its engineering board. In 1986 he was named a fellow of SAE.

The Honors Program proposal was one of 77 funded out of 400 submissions, according to Dr. Ralph Coppola, director of sponsored programs.

BOARD OF CONTROL COMMITTEE **STUDIES BUDGET REQUEST**

The Board of Control's Business and Facilities Committee focused on planning for the 1988-89 budget request, which will be submitted to the state in November. The preparation is one step in the process leading to annual state appropriations.

Details of the administration's plan are not final, and will reflect input received from Board members at the Sept. 30 meeting. The preliminary proposal asks for a 15.9% increase in operating

funds over 1987-88. If state-approved, it would bring SVSC's appropriation to \$16,048,817. The budget also will list several program revision requests, including \$320,000 to hire additional full-time faculty and money for start up costs for the Fine Arts Center, Wickes Hall, and the Health and Physical Education Complex.

A separate request for capital outlay also is in preparation. It likely will include funds for planning and beginning construction of a center for business and professional development.

Other items under consideration are planning and construction money for a central heating and cooling plant and planning money for phase II of the Fine Arts Center and for I.F. #3. Priority order for these requests is yet to be set.

Committee members learned that electrical service to the campus will be upgraded, and discussed renewal of a line of credit agreement with Michigan National Bank.

They also were told that the change to university status could take place before year's end.
