VALLEY WOODWIND QUINTET BEGINS FIFTH SEASON

The Valley Woodwind Quintet will begin its fifth performance season with a concert on November 17.

During the quintet's premier concert of the 1987-88 season,

the group will feature pianist Catherine McMichael in the Mozart Quintet in E-flat, K. 452, as well as works by Jean Martinon, Percy Grainger and Walter Piston.

The performance begins at 8 p.m. in the SVSC Theatre. Tickets will be available at

the door for \$5 and \$3.

The quintet will open the concert with "Domenon," by French composer and conductor Martinon. "Domenon" is a 20th century lyrical, one-movement piece built on two melodies.

Next, the Mozart Quintet will be performed. The piece is billed as one of the "greatest works in the genre." Mozart himself considered it the best piece he ever wrote.

Grainger's "Walking Tune No. 3" will be the third piece performed. This short piece combines melodies with hints of richness.

Concluding the concert will be a rendition of American Piston's Quintet for wind instrument. The piece is a four-movement, mid-20th century masterpiece.

Joining the quintet for the concert will be flutist Lauren Rongo. Rongo has experience in quintet and orchestral groups.

Members of the quintet are faculty members and Midland Symphony principals. They are: William Wollner, associate professor of music, French horn; Dr. Drew Hinderer, professor of philosophy and English, bassoon, Jane Bellen, oboe; Linda Hargett, clarinet.

The Terrorist Threat

Colonel Charles W. Scott was a military expert on the Mideast during his thirty-one year Army career and he was held hostage for 444 days in Iran when the United States embassy, where he served as Chief of the Defense Liaison Office, was invaded by terrorists.

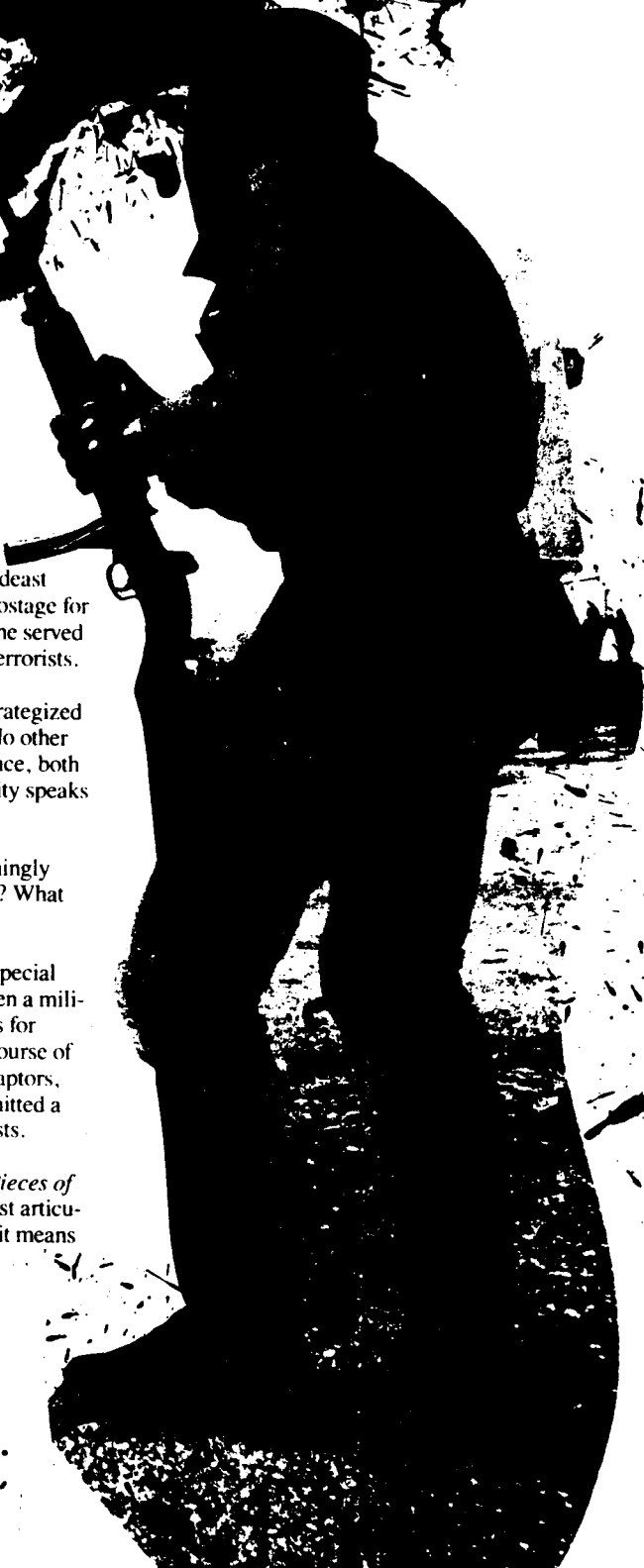


