CAMPUS WELCOMES POLISH AUTHOR

Polish author Grzegorz Musial will appear at SVSU on Mon., Oct. 24 to read from his work and discuss recent events in Poland.

Musial, a visitor this year at the University of Iowa's International Writer's Workshop, is a respected member of the current literary generation in Poland. Born in 1952 in Bydgoszcz, he combines a career as a medical doctor with a vigorous schedule of writing.

Musial has published two collections of poems, a book of translations (Allen Ginsburg's poetry) and three novels. One of these, Czech Jewelry, now is under consideration by American publishers. An excerpt from the novel is included in the 1986 Green River Review, special Polish issue, which was edited by associate professor of English Gary Thompson.

Musial's work portrays life in Poland with all its ironies and disappointments, while avoiding simple political statements. His novels give the reader an inside view of contemporary Polish life, and demonstrate that life's problems can be felt in any country. In Czech Jewelry Musial describes his hometown.

Poland is to Europe. Here, as if under a magnifying glass, have been focused guilts, complaints and complexes which have not been given a satisfactory outlet in art or the triumphs of war."

The author's visit to SVSU is under the auspices of the Office of International Programs. It is sponsored by the departments of English and Modern Foreign Languages.

Musial's reading and discussion will take place at 11:30 a.m. in the Zahnow Library Lounge. The campus community is invited.

PUBLIC SAFETY REPORTS DATA

Be extra careful on Weds., especially those in the month of April. According to the annual report published by the Department of Public Safety, more accidents occur on Weds. than any other day, and April is the high month for both accidents and traffic violations at SVSU.

The report, available from the Public Safety office, shows crimes against persons and

miscellaneous crimes were down in 1987, compared to 1986, but the number of property crimes climbed. Only four crimes against people were reported in 1987.

The report lists data on a variety of Public Safety services. Did you know there were 187 reports of lost and found articles in 1987, up from 116 in 1986? Interestingly, only 82 articles were reported missing, while 104 found items were turned in.

SVSU AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLANS AVAILABLE

An affirmative action plan listing program information, commitments and tasks to be accomplished has been distributed to the University's Executive Committee, deans, directors and department chairpersons. The document spells out institutional policies and sets forth an action plan. Policies were approved by the Board of Control in May.

An update of SVSU's earlier plan, the document opens with a policy statement. "Saginaw Valley State University declares and reaffirms a policy of equal employment opportunity, equal educational opportunity, and nondiscrimination in the provision of educational and other services to the public."

It contains an analysis of the current work force and sets institutional goals and timetables, as well as establishing a system to monitor progress toward goals.

FLU VACCINE AVAILABLE

If you are in a high risk group, or simply desire to reduce the odds of suffering the aches and pains of influenza, help is available from SVSU Health Services, ext. 4271.

Influenza vaccinations are available there at a cost of \$6. They are especially recommended for people with chronic cardiovascular, pulmonary or metabolic disorders, kidney disease, anemia or lowered immunity. Adults over 65 and people who have extensive contact with high-risk patients also are advised to be immunized. However, people allergic to eggs should not receive the vaccine.
