Month-Long Black History Observance Planned

Students, faculty and staff will participate in a month-long observance of Black History Month beginning Friday, Feb. 1. Residents from surrounding communities also are invited to participate in the events.

The celebration opens with a symbolic candlelighting ceremony accompanied by poetry and other readings from noon to 1:30 p.m. The event, sponsored by SVSU's 35-member Black Students Association, takes place in Wickes Hall lobby.

Other highlights of the observance include a series of guest speakers, concerts, forums, an elementary school basketball tournament and lectures by notable national and local black personalities. Featured is a presentation by Lonise Bias, whose son, Len Bias, died of a crack cocaine overdose two days after being drafted by the Boston Celtics of the NBA. Len Bias had an outstanding collegiate career with the University of Maryland and was considered to have great potential.

Other speakers are Dr. Linda Beard, associate professor of English at Michigan State University; Marvin Pryor, principal of Flint Northern High School; and Rev. London, Saginaw's Tabernacle Baptist Church. Dr. Roosevelt Ruffin, director of multi-cultural programs, will lead on open forum on "How to Deal with Racism on Campus." A panel discussion will explore "Educating Young Americans: An Inner-city View."

Activities conclude with an invitation-only dinner for King/Chavez/Parks Graduate Program Scholarship recipients, past and present, and KCP Distinguished Professors on Thursday, Feb. 28.

Paintings of B.B. Winslow on Display in University Art Gallery

The February 5 to 28 exhibit in the University Art Gallery will feature abstract oils by Midland artist Bruce B. Winslow.

Winslow's paintings often are monumental in scale and are characterized by vibrant pure color orchestration," said Dr. Barron Hirsch, professor of art and coordinator of the gallery shows. "They are embellished by high gloss finishes which are contrasted against matte finishes."

The exhibition will feature approximately 15 canvases and works on paper, most of which are recent works. A few important evolutionary works from previous years will accent the show. The works are partially inspired visually and thematically by Winslow's interest in Italian Baroque and Rococo, according to Hirsch. "With an affinity to the writings and expressionism of Wasily Kandinsky, Winslow arrives at a lyrical expressionism," he said.

Winslow earned a Master of Fine Arts from Pratt Institute in Brooklyn and a Bachelor of Fine Arts from CMU. He serves as adjunct faculty member in SVSU's art department and as museum administrator for the Midland Center for the Arts.

"I work toward establishing a Canon of Beauty," Winslow said of his art. "To do so, my work must be poetic, metaphoric, religious and philosophical. In being so, it is an homage to the gift of life."

Winter Enrollment Climbs

Enrollment continued to rise as 319 more students registered for winter semester classes than were enrolled last year at this time. Overall totals showed 5,920 students this January, compared with 5,601 last year, a 5.7 percent increase. Credit hours increased by 6.9 percent.

The winter increase was expected because fall semester registrations were at a record high. James P. Dwyer, director of admissions, noted there was a 9.7 percent rise in undergraduate transfer students. "It seems to show that the University is gaining a reputation as providing a high quality education to its students. Also, more parents are finding it difficult to pay the added expenses of sending a student away to school when it costs less for them to stay home and get an education."

The Cardinals host the SVSU Invitational Friday at 5 p.m. in O'Neill Arena.

Susan M. Browning

Three times around is just fine with Sue Browning. Currently an administrative secretary in the Office of Public Affairs, Browning has been with SVSU, off and on, since 1969.

Administrative Secretary, Office of Public Affairs "I came here when we were in the '66-'68 Building," she notes. "I worked for Bob Hanes then. We used to come over to Wickes Hall before it was occupied to assign room numbers," she recalls.

In fact, Hanes once used the unfinished building as a ploy to pull off a surprise bridal shower planned by co-workers. The party was scheduled just prior to her fall 1969 marriage to Dennis Browning.

"Bob brought me over to Wickes and dropped me off, saying he would be back at 4:15. Wickes was nothing but a pile of cement surrounded by mud at the time. He was late, and I was getting quite anxious by the time he arrived at 4:30. He took me to the restaurant where everyone was waiting to greet me!"

After three years Browning transferred into Education, where she worked for Dr. Hal Peterson and Dr. Guy Lee. She left in 1972 when her first child was born. A second child arrived in 1974.

But in 1975 Browning returned to work with Lee in development of the Macomb graduate

education program. "I enjoyed working with the students," she says. "It was fun connecting voices on the phone with faces. They were adult students and they were appreciative. They had definite goals, and we were their way to get there."

Browning began another break from the office routine at the end of 1976. Another daughter, born in 1978, completed her family.

In 1982 she again was drawn to SVSU, returning for a temporary position in Sponsored Programs. When that was completed, she moved into a newly-created secretarial position in the Foundation office. "I came in time for the (Arbury) Fine Arts Center fund-raising campaign and building project," she notes. "Al Beutler shared a lot of that with his staff, and I got to meet many people. It was interesting to see the project evolve and grow."

Her most recent transition began in January 1990 as a dual assignment serving both the Foundation and the Office of Public Affairs. Presently her duties are exclusively for Public Affairs. "Now I have exposure to different kinds of people through Dr. (John) Fallon's work with the legislature and other segments of the public," she says.

"Our contact with external people is frequent," notes Fallon, vice president for public affairs. "Sue Browning conveys a most positive institutional image to people unfamiliar with the University. This, coupled with her ability to manage several complex projects simultaneously and work at a fast pace, makes her a very valuable staff member."

Browning enjoys the variety in her present duties, as well as the contact with the public. She is pleased that "people seem to feel comfortable communicating through me."
