Dean Kerman Addresses Convocation

A record number of students graduating from SVSU's Honors Program will be among the outstanding academic achievers to hear this year's Honors Convocation keynote address delivered by Dr. Judith B. Kerman.


Speaking on "Technology as a Shaper of Culture," Dr. Kerman will make her first public appearance on the SVSU campus since being appointed dean of the College of Arts and Behavioral Sciences earlier this year. She is scheduled to assume her responsibilities as dean July 1.

Nine Honors Program students, who maintained at least a 3.4 (B-plus) grade point average throughout their college careers and

completed work on their theses, will be among those acclaimed during the convocation at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, April 11 in the University Theatre. The seniors, who will participate in commencement exercises May 4, comprise the largest group of honors students ever to complete theses during an academic year.

The convocation also will acknowledge some 240 students who will graduate with honors. The nine students who participated in the Honors Program will have their names read by Dr. Basil Clark, professor of English, and will receive a red carnation symbolizing their achievement at the University.

SVSU faculty and staff are invited to join in an honor guard near the entrance to the steps of the Theatre. Academic regalia, although not required for this ceremony, is available at the Bookstore for those who placed an order for commencement. A reception in the Theatre Lobby follows the ceremony, where guests can greet Dr. Kerman and congratulate students.

Recognition night for SVSU's 160 faculty, 294 staff members and three other notables from outside the campus is Saturday, Apr. 13. The second annual All-University Awards ceremony will feature presentations of three Distinguished Service Medallions to community leaders selected for their special service to the University. Presentation of awards for length of service to SVSU (10, 15, 20 and 25 years) and recognition for those who were selected as "Staff Member of the Month" during the past year also is on the program.

Classical Duo-Pianists to Appear at SVSU

"Delphin and Romain," Afro-American duopianists and faculty members from Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, will give a lecture/demonstration Thursday, Apr. 18, at 4 p.m. in the SVSU Theatre.

Wilfred Delphin and Edwin Romain have earned critical acclaim for their interpretations of bravura compositions and classic duo-piano repertoire. The team's treatment of Mozart has been called "bright and effective." Their technical prowess is showcased in the demanding works of Rachmaninoff.

Delphin and Romain began their partnership in 1968 as students at Xavier University in New Orleans. Upon graduation, both went on to earn master's degrees from Southern Illinois University and doctorate degrees from the University of Mississippi.

The duo made their professional debut in 1977 as soloists with the Symphony of the New World in New York's Carnegie Hall.

Since then, they have appeared as guest artists with some of America's finest orchestras, including the New York Philharmonic with Zubin Mehta, the Minnesota Orchestra with Neville Marriner, the Cleveland Orchestra, the Atlanta Symphony and the New Orleans Philharmonic.

Their performance with the New York Philharmonic was nationally broadcast on the Exxon/New York Philharmonic radio network in the summer of 1984.

When on tour, the duo transport two sevenfoot Baldwin grand pianos. Delphin and Romain also have toured internationally, performing to sold out houses.
