# Clowns, Clowns and More Clowns at Family Festival Day

The Second Annual Family Festival Day on Saturday, Oct. 5, is shaping up as a day's worth of fun and frolic. Clowns are the theme of this year's Festival and 10 to 12 clowns will be juggling, stilt walking and generally cavorting throughout the day at various locations across the campus.

Day-long activities include open recreation at Ryder Center from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Among entertainment for youngsters are a Children's Hour for three to eight year-olds in the SVSU Children's Center between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. and a film fest in Cardinal Gym from 1 to 5 p.m. for five to 11-year-olds. Tickets for the film fest can be purchased at registration or at the event entrance. There is no fee for the Children's Hour.

The Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Gallery will be open for tours from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Shoppers can purchase gift items from the SVSU Bookstore from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

"Brunch with the Bunch" in Doan Cafeteria from 10:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. will feature a hearty buffet for \$4.95, \$2.50 for children under 10. Tickets can be purchased at the door.

A 50-year-old Circus Calliope will be heard all over campus from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Family Festival excitement continues with gridiron action in Wickes Stadium. The Cardinals will face Grand Valley at 1:30 p.m. The pre-game show by the SVSU Marching Band begins at 1:10 p.m. Family Day participants will gain free admission to the game with a registration button.

Spectators can join a Clown Parade after the game from Wickes Stadium to the Arbury

Fine Arts Center for a post-game reception at 4:30 p.m. Refreshments will be served. In addition, dedication of the *Three Clowns* sculptures will take place at around 5 p.m.

A unique dining experience will be offered at an "Under the Big Top" spaghetti dinner in Lower Level Doan Center from 5:30 to 7 p.m. Tickets, which will be available at the door, are \$3.95 per person, with children under two free.

Providing the Family Festival Feature Entertainment will be Stanley Allan Sherman, featuring the *Star Spangled Banner*. The "Aero Show" has been hailed as the most popular one-man show ever and Sherman has the rare talent to bring life to the inanimate masks he dons and creates.

Sherman is described as a cosmic clown with aerodynamic charm who blends Vaudeville, commedia dell'arte, patriotism and existentialism in a zany, bizarre and hilarious show. The performance is set for 7:30 p.m. in the SVSU Theatre. Seating is limited. Admission is free to those who register for Family Festival Day activities.

Sherman will provide a repeat performance the following afternoon. Open to the public, tickets for the 2 p.m. show on Oct. 6 will go on sale at the Theatre beginning at 12:30 p.m. Admission is \$4 for adults and \$2 for children.

### Associate Director of IEPE Selected

Laina Savory has been named associate director of the Institute for Environmental Policy and Education. She began her duties September 9.

As associate director, she will head efforts to set up the Institute and establish goals and programs for the organization. "Nothing is set in stone at this point," Savory said. "The Institute is being created here."

IEPE will work in conjunction with the Consortium for International Earth Science Information Network (CIESIN) to integrate environmental information into the educational system. This summer SVSU was the site of a three-day workshop that linked middle school teachers from six states via satellite, phone,

computer and cable television. The teachers learned about the effects of fresh water pollution and were able to consult experts in the field.

Savory, who came to SVSU from a position as executive assistant to the U.M. Faculty Senate, graduated summa cum laude from Randolph-Macon Women's College. She holds M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Princeton.

A sociologist, Savory has extensive research credits. She has worked with simulation and game techniques and served as managing editor of Simulation and Games: An International Journal of Theory, Research and Design. She is the author of several professional articles and papers.

In addition to her IEPE responsibilities, Savory will be teaching courses in sociology and environmental education.


SVSU's Tina Apsey is a case in point. Since 1989 she has been a Big Sister, sharing her time with a young "sibling."

## CIESIN Board of Trustees Elects Two New Vice Presidents

Since March 1991 Gregorka served as director of finance and administration for CIESIN. His previous professional experience includes a position as vice president of administration for the National Sanitation Foundation in Ann Arbor. He also has worked in the water resources management field. His B.S. in biology/geology is from the University of Rochester. He has an M.S. in water resources management from the University of Michigan Rackham Graduate School and an M.B.A. from the U-M Graduate School of Business Administration.

Construction has begun on a 44-foot long brick wall with raised letters and the SVSU logo, which soon will replace the red and white pylon that once signaled the main entrance to campus. ## Health Risk Appraisal Report Available

During winter semester 1991, approximately 20 percent of SVSU employees participated in a health risk appraisal program provided by Bene Corporation. Dr. Jennifer Bridges, chair of the Wellness Committee, has received a report of the results, which are compared to a national sample of like status.

According to Bridges, the major point to emerge from the appraisal is that SVSU employees would benefit from increased physical fitness. Weight loss is another identified need, as is the area of stress management.

Based on comparisons with national data, offering wellness programs could result in a substantial savings to the University due to a drop in the predicted number of hospital days by employees.
