Nelson Accepts Rhode Island Post

David Nelson is leaving SVSU March 16 to begin duties as Dean of the School of Education and Human Services at Rhode Island College. His responsibilities there will include supervision of an education program that includes 87 faculty in six departments.

"The school has a newly established doctoral program in educational leadership," Nelson said. The Henry Barnard Laboratory School also is operated by Rhode Island's school of education. It is the second oldest such school in the U.S. and has a staff of some 35 teachers, Nelson said.

In addition the college, through its education school, operates a minority education program in partnership with the City of Providence.

"My experiences here will be beneficial in dealing with my new responsibilities," Nelson said.

Since coming to SVSU as dean in 1987, Nelson has coordinated a restructuring of the College of Education into three teaching departments. The undergraduate program was revised and new graduate programs were added in Special Education and Educational Leadership. Positive relationships also were initiated with several external groups and schools during that time span.

"We are extremely appreciative of the leadership Dr. Nelson has provided during his tenure here," said Vice President for Academic Affairs Robert S.P. Yien. "He and his faculty have worked diligently for the past three years to achieve NCATE accreditation. We have every reason to believe that effort will be successful."

Nelson noted that Yien has been very supportive of the College of Education in its progress. "His involvement and participation have been important to the strides we've made."

A farewell reception will take place in the reception area on the third floor of Wickes Hall from 3-4:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 24. The campus community is invited to join in wishing Dean Nelson success at Rhode Island College.

Shikoku Women's University in Tokushima, Japan will host a five-week exchange program for SVSU students in May-June, 1992. Students receive five credits in Humanities and Social Science for intensive study of Japanese language, life and culture.



Occupational Therapy Degree Gets Control Board Okay

The Board of Control, on Monday, gave its approval for the creation of a baccalaureate degree program in Occupational Therapy. Following a presentation by Dean Crystal Lange, the Board voted to authorize the College of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences to begin raising about \$100,000 to hire faculty next fall and to admit students for the winter semester of 1993.

The Board's action follows a two-year feasibility study conducted by the College of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences. The study measured the interest of high school and college students, as well as health care providers who would eventually employ the program's graduates. Dr. Lange said employers who responded to the survey reported about 50 to 60 vacancies currently exist for occupational therapists throughout the Tri-County and Thumb region.

Dr. Lange said she has received about 35 letters of support for creation of the new curriculum. She said the College of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences expects to admit about 40 students per semester and to train about 80 students a year once the program is fully operational. SVSU joins Wayne State, Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan Universities in offering the degree.

Students must complete 51 credit hours prior to admission and achieve an overall 2.5 GPA. "The program will prepare professionally qualified occupational therapists who can treat clients who are limited in their ability to perform developmentally appropriate tasks and roles," Dr. Lange said.

Graduates will be qualified to assist the growth and development of premature babies, aid the learning process of physically

challenged school children, help build selfesteem in teens recovering from effects of substance abuse and assist in the rehabilitation of stroke victims and injured workers, Dr. Lange said.

The Board also heard registrar Paul Saft report that SVSU's winter semester enrollment passed the 6,000 mark, increasing by 5.1 per cent over last year to 6,223 students. Credit hours for the same period increased to 59,473, about 5.5 percent over last year. Female students (3,707) continued to outnumber males (2,516), showing an increase of 194 females to 109 male registrations. Ethnic minorities accounted for 63 of the 303 additional students enrolled during the 1992 winter semester.
