

# News Conference Highlights Legislature's Approval of Funds for New \$33 Million SVSU Business and Professional Development Center

Plans for construction of a new Business and Professional Development building on the SVSU campus are going forward following approval of funding by the Michigan Legislature. House of Representatives approval on June 30 followed earlier passage by the Senate and enabled the state to provide about \$33 million in building authority to the University over the next three years.

At a July 1 news conference, University President Eric Gilbertson credited State Senator Jon Cisky (R-Saginaw) with leading the legislative effort in the Senate and praised House Speaker Lewis Dodak (D-Montrose) and Representatives James O'Neill (D-Saginaw) and Rollie Niederstadt (D-Saginaw) for their active support in Lansing. Gilbertson also expressed appreciation to Governor Engler, saying, "The project exemplifies the Governor's commitment to support education in the state at all levels."



"We aren't doing anything that's much different here than what's already been done for other universities around the state,"
O'Neill told reporters and University faculty and staff members who gathered outside the Arbury Center to hear the good news. Cisky, a former Criminal Justice department faculty member, said construction of the new building "will provide good, high-paying jobs for the University and will benefit the entire Tri-City area."



SVSU Vice President for Public Affairs John Fallon said he anticipated the next seven months will be devoted to development and approval of final construction plans for the three-story structure, which will be larger than the Ryder Center and taller than the water tower. He said he expects the building will be completed sometime in 1994.

The 202,900 square foot building will serve as the main entryway to the University's core campus and will be located in an area now devoted to Lot C. It will link Doan Center with the Arbury Fine Arts Center at the east end of the central quadrangle.

When complete, the structure will house a 600-seat performing arts auditorium complex, a 300-seat recital hall, multi-purpose classrooms and computer laboratory space, a three-story, glass-enclosed, reception/student lounge area, multimedia technical facilities, office space for faculty and staff of the College of Business and Management and similar office space for student leadership activities, volunteer services and the University Conference Center.

Preliminary plans, developed jointly by the Southfield-based architectural firm of Yee Associates, Inc. and University faculty and staff members, were revealed last fall. At that time, the University's Board of Control gave preliminary approval to schematic drawings illustrating floor plans and exterior views of the proposed structure. With the Governor's approval, work can proceed on detailed construction drawings.

# Second Taiwanese Class Begins MBA Study at SVSU

Since the end of June, Pine Grove Apartments has served as home for 23 Taiwanese graduate students working toward a Master of Business Administration. On Monday, June 29, the second class of Taiwanese mid-level managers began formal classes at SVSU.

The new group will pursue essentially the same curriculum path followed by 29 other Taiwanese MBA candidates who began the SVSU portion of their studies last summer. Like the earlier group, the new students have accumulated between six and eight years of practical experience working at jobs on their home island in science, technology and investment banking. Both groups of candidates underwent preparatory training at Taiwan's

Tamking University before coming to the United States.

Studies undertaken by the new group of students include Accounting for Management Decisions (ACCT 612), Organizational Behavior (MGT 621) and a class dealing with research tools, techniques and a year-long research project (MGT 698).

The first group is expected to return to the SVSU campus July 26 to complete their year-long research project and to spend about 40 additional hours in the classroom studying the Social Environment of Business (MGT 690) and Financial Planning and Control (FIN 604). They will participate in Commencement exercises on December 6 in Taiwan.

# **SVSU Alumnus Earns Doctorate**


