Steering Committee Begins Self-Study Process, Seeks Input

Headed by a steering committee, work has begun in preparation for renewal of SVSU's accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA). The primary task of the steering committee, chaired by Crystal Lange, is to develop a self-study plan and coordinate its implementation.

Lange notes that NCA has established clear criteria for accreditation, and the self-study report will address those criteria, which are:

- 1. The institution has clear and publicly stated purposes, consistent with its mission and appropriate to a postsecondary educational institution.
- 2. Human, financial and physical resources are effectively organized into educational and other programs to accomplish institutional purposes.
- 3. The institution is accomplishing its purposes.
- 4. The institution can continue to accomplish its purposes.

To meet the criteria, Lange says, the self-study will focus on outcomes of institutional programs and processes. Existing evaluation and planning processes will be identified and integrated into the self-study process.

The steering committee will review institutional materials and processes, determine goals for the self-study process and develop a plan that includes timetables for each component of the study and the resulting report, which should be completed in October 1993.

The committee hopes to involve a broad cross section of the campus community in the self-study process, Lange says. "Our goal is to get as many of the University community

as possible — faculty, staff and students — to participate in a series of open forums related to the self-study. People are invited to share their perspectives, ask questions and get involved in the process," she says.

"If you are not able to go to the forums, by all means speak to members of the steering committee and subcommittees," she adds.

Membership of the steering committee and subcommittees is listed on an insert sheet. Dates of the forums, which take place from 4-5:30 p.m. in room 143 of the Science Building, are:

NCA accreditation is a four-part process, Lange points out. The steps are:

- ► A self-study examining how the institution meets general requirements and NCA criteria.
- ► A site visit by an NCA team. (March 14-15, 1994 at SVSU)
- ▶ Review of the institutional self-study report and the team report by a Readers' Panel and/or a Review Committee.
- ▶ Consideration of the panel's and/or review committee's recommendations (and any institutional responses) by the NCA Commission, which takes official action on accreditation.

Textbook Scholarship Recognizes Chenoweth

In lieu of a University-sponsored reception for Betty Chenoweth, SVSU will offer a textbook scholarship for the 1993-94 academic year. The stipend will recognize Chenoweth's long service in a manner most in keeping with her wishes, according to Vice President for Administration and Business Affairs Jerry A. Woodcock.

Chenoweth, who joined the SVSU staff in September 1967 as bookstore manager and was designated director of the SVSU Bookstore in 1988, concluded more than 25 years' service Friday, October 16. During her tenure, she served on many campus committees and guided growth of the bookstore to accommodate increasing student enrollment.

Mackie Appointed Interim Dean

Wayne E. Mackie, currently acting assistant dean in the College of Business and Management, will become interim dean of the college January 1, 1993 while the search for a permanent dean takes place. He will replace James L. Mitchell, who retires at the end of the current year.

Mackie joined the SVSU faculty in 1977 and is a professor of finance in addition to holding administrative responsibilities. He holds a bachelor's degree from St. Mary's College, an M.B.A. from Georgia State University and a Ph.D. from Michigan State U.

Nursing Students to Benefit from Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund for SVSU nursing students is being established in the names of Don and Iva Bellinger. The fund, estimated at about \$700,000, will be administered by Second National Bank. It was provided in the will of Iva Mary Bellinger, who died on January 10, 1992 at the age of 90.

Al Beutler, executive director of the SVSU Foundation, recently learned of the fund. According to the terms of the will, he said, income from the trust is to be used in paying the expenses, in whole or in part, of deserving students in SVSU's nursing program. Financial need is a requirement.

Beutler also noted that the Jay Hornsby Memorial Scholarship fund is at \$26,200.

Social Work Teach-In Examines Welfare, Women and Children

SVSU's Department of Social Work is participating in a national initiative that takes place during the week of October 19-23 to educate students, professionals and the community about welfare issues. A focal point of the effort is a series of teach-in events at schools of social work across the country.

The program has been endorsed by the National Association of Social Workers, the Council of Social Work Education, the National Association of Deans and Directors and other social work organizations. Resource materials have been distributed to all participating groups, including SVSU. They include:

- the report "Beyond Rhetoric" issued by the Rockefeller Commission on Children;
- a special edition of "Welfare Reform: What Should We Do for Our Nation's Poor?" issued by the Study Circles Resource Center;
- "Selected Background Material on Welfare Programs" jointly developed by the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, the Center for Law and Social Policy and the Children's Defense Fund; and
- NASW's position on "Behavioral Welfare Initiatives."

In addition, department chairperson Ann Rae has received a video titled "Poverty, Welfare and America's Families: A Hard Look." The film contains four 30-minute programs on welfare issues.

One teach-in session was conducted Monday, Oct. 19 and another is set for Thursday, Oct. 22 from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in room 155 Pioneer Hall. The event is open to all interested members of the campus community. Further topic discussion took place in the Monday afternoon "Introduction to Social Work/Welfare" class taught by Steve Yanca, and teach-in materials are available throughout the week in the Social Work Office, 341 Brown Hall.

Rae and her colleagues consider it imperative to focus attention on issues related to welfare, particularly those concerning poorwomen and children. Among the goals of the teach-ins are promotion of linkages between social work education, social work practitioners and others working on these issues.

Stuart Dybek, a member of the department of English at Western Michigan University, and Lawrence Pike, an English professor from Macomb County Community College, will kick off the series on Thursday, Nov. 5.

Dybek will read from his works of poetry and short stories. He has published a book of poems titled *Brass Knuckles*, *Childhood and Other Neighborhoods*. His other works include a fiction book and several short stories published in *Atlantic Monthly*; *Poetry* and *Paris Review*.

Control Board Hears Record Enrollment Report, Approves Parking Expansion and Appoints Board of Fellows Members

Tabulation of final figures shows new records set by 6,869 students enrolled for 66,945 credit hours in the 1992 fall semester. During its regular meeting, the University Board of Control was told the figures represent a 6.1 percent increase in students over the 1991 enrollment and a 7 percent increase in credit hours.

Registrar Paul Saft said increases in the number of students were reflected in several categories, but the most notable upswing was in the number of freshmen recently graduated from area high schools. The increase was sufficient to lower the average age of all students from 27 to 26 years of age, Saft said.

Geographically, Tuscola County enrollments increased by 101 students to 643 for an 18.6 percent increase over last year. Midland County enrollments rose to 517 for a 9.3 percent increase. Still representing the largest number of enrollments from the four-county area, Saginaw and Bay Counties showed 2.7 and 1.7 percent increases, respectively.

President Gilbertson said the increases place a strain on existing resources, including a greater demand for parking. Coupled with the anticipated loss of available space in Parking Lot C, when construction begins on the new Business and Professional Development Building, the Board approved a request to begin construction on Parking Lot K.

Located south-east of the Science Building at the bend in Collings Drive near Ryder Center, Parking Lot K is expected to

accommodate about 196 vehicles at a cost not to exceed \$200,000. Plans call for the lot to be completed before severe winter weather sets in.

The Board approved a resolution, required by Michigan Public Act 291, which calls for civil fines of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 for handicap parking violations. Previously the fine had been \$25.

By resolution, the Board also approved appointment to the Board of Fellows of David T. Buzzelli, vice president and corporate director of the Dow Chemical Company, Midland; Vincente Castellanos, diagnostician, Quality Network, General Motors Powertrain Division, Saginaw; Anne M. DeBoer, manager, Corporate Contributions, Dow Corning Corporation, Midland; Paul Virciglio, vice president and general manager of WNEM TV-5, Saginaw; and Jerome Yantz, partner, Weinlander, Fitzhugh, Gertuleit & Schairer, Bay City. Reappointed to the Board were Gerald Blumenau, Bruce M. Groom, Terry Niederstadt, Earl Selby, Eric Strain and Robert Vittito.

Before convening in executive session to discuss collective bargaining and possible real estate acquisition, the Board heard a presentation on the programs of the College and Arts and Behavioral Sciences by Dean Judith Kerman and faculty members Ken Gewerth and Paul Munn. Robert Yien gave a preliminary report on the self-study process required for reaccreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

This is an unofficial report of Board activities. Official minutes are on file in the library.

SVSU Engineering Enrollment Jumps

Dr. Thomas Kullgren, dean of the College of Science, Engineering and Technology, recently released figures on student enrollment in electrical engineering and mechanical engineering.

These programs began in 1984 with 131 students; today 387 students are enrolled. Since the programs were first accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology two years ago, enrollments have increased 22 percent, Kullgren said.

Kullgren attributes the increase to SVSU's exceptional laboratories, personal attention paid to students by faculty, a flexible schedule of classes and the reasonable costs of education compared to other state engineering schools.
