CNN Business News Anchor to Conduct First Wickson-Nickless Lecture

One of America's most experienced television anchors will be the first in a series of guest speakers composing the Wickson-Nickless Distinguished Lectureship in Business.

Stuart A. Varney, host of Cable News Network's (CNN) "Business Morning and Business Day" program, will present "Clintonomics: The First Glimpse" on Monday, March 29 at 7:30 p.m. in the SVSU Theatre.

Varney, a London School of Economics graduate and founder of CNN's Business Team, won a Peabody Award for his coverage of the 1987 Stock Market Crash. He hosts "Your Money with Stuart Varney," which is CNN's top rated business program.

KEMO TV in San Francisco featured Varney as anchorman on "Stock Market Today," one of the earliest business programs on American television. Varney also served as anchorman for "CNN Business News" and was the first person to broadcast live for CNN from New York. He is one of CNN's original employees.

The Wickson-Nickless Distinguished Lectureship in Business offers the opportunity to study and debate contemporary events and issues that influence business policies and behavior. The series honors the late James E. Wickson and Allen E. Nickless, of Frankenmuth, who both joined Universal Engineering Company in 1928. Under the leadership of Wickson and Nickless, the company grew to a workforce of 650 employees.

The boards of these two family foundations jointly provide an endowment for SVSU to conduct the programs, with arrangements for topics and speakers made by the College of Business and Management. Those interested in attending the program may make reservations by calling ext. 4064.

Original SVSU Fundraisers Endow Philosophy and Religion Lectureship

Thirty years after the first fund-raising campaign was launched on behalf of Saginaw Valley College, the couple who chaired that effort has donated \$15,000 to the University for a series of lectures in Philosophy and Religion.

The three-year series, named for William and Julia Edwards, is "part of the University's effort to enrich the intellectual and cultural life of the campus and the community," President Eric R. Gilbertson said, announcing the bequest.

Professor of Philosophy Drew Hinderer

said, "I think the Edwards Lectureship is a terrifically important and exciting development for SVSU. As the University matures, we need to raise our sights and expectations from what gets us by to what is really first rate. I can't think of a better way to do this than by bringing to this campus—to our classes and the community—absolutely first rate scholars to work with our students and faculty."

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Call 9-911 for Emergency Help

From time to time emergencies arise on campus that require assistance from police, medical or fire personnel. Should you require emergency assistance, you can shorten response time by dialing 9-911 from any oncampus phone.

This procedure will put you in touch with Central Dispatch, where an operator will take information from you regarding the nature of the emergency. From off-campus locations, or from pay phones in campus buildings, you may dial 911 directly, without dialing 9 first. For your reference, this information is listed at the top of page one in the Faculty/Staff Directory.

Central Dispatch will contact the SVSU Department of Public Safety. They will dispatch an officer to the emergency location.

Asbestos Precaution Training, Procedures Set

If you observe what could be a mini space station and aliens in Wickes Hall, don't rush to report it as a sighting. The phenomenon will be SVSU Physical Plant personnel complying with procedures to protect themselves and the building environment from any possible contamination by asbestos fibers.

According to Physical Plant Director Bob Tutsock, testing last fall revealed that asbestos had been used in the original construction of Wickes Hall. The material was sprayed on structural steel.

"At this point, tests indicate that none of the material is loose or airborne, so it poses no danger to Wickes Hall occupants or visitors," Tutsock said. "Normal office and classroom activities will not put people in contact with the material. However, from time to time maintenance workers must enter crawl spaces above ceilings and would be in an area where the asbestos was sprayed. We have established procedures to protect them and the environment from possible hazard."

These measures include disposable protective garb and a small temporary enclosure called a "Kontrol Kube," Tutsock said. After receiving a physical, workers are trained in the proper use of the clothing and the cube, which contains a vacuum mechanism and filters. Maintenance staff who might perform tasks in this environment will receive annual physicals, and the building will be tested periodically for the presence of airborne asbestos particles.

Until the training is complete, no workers will be allowed to enter the affected areas. Tutsock stressed that there is no present danger to office staff, faculty and students. Persons with questions about the procedures may contact Tutsock at ext. 4080.

series are William Alston, of Syracuse University, whose recently published book, *Perceiving God*, explores the logical basis of religious belief and suggests that religious experience has real value as knowledge; Robert Merrihew Adams, of UCLA, who contends that moral obligation must be founded on relationship with God; and Islamic scholar, Professor Peter Awn, of Columbia University, whose work offers greater understanding and insight to the ongoing tensions between the world of Islam and the West.

Plans call for the first lectures to be presented during the 1993-94 academic year, the others during 1994-95 and 1995-96.

IBM Loans Computer Station, Software to College of Education

An IBM computer work station on loan to the College of Education will provide resource materials showing how to develop curricula for the computer assisted classroom.

"The work station comes complete with approximately four year's worth of software designed to teach mathematics, science and language arts from kindergarten through 12th grades," said Norman R. Sterchele, professor of Educational Leadership and Services.


Included with the computer and software are video tapes that introduce teachers to a number of software programs.

"These programs are effective instructional tools in all areas of the school curriculum," Sterchele said. Included for student and teacher use are indexes to software (indexed by subject and objective) and curriculum guides to help teachers decide how to use the computer and software.

"The center also will stock introductory brochures describing several other software products that could be employed in the classroom.

"This equipment, software, videos and printed materials will be updated on a regular basis by IBM," Sterchele continued. "The update program will allow our Educational Resources Center to offer SVSU students a quality introduction to IBM curricula and software."

Currently the curricula that are available

on the station are: Language Arts for Grades K-6; Mathematics for Grades K-6; Mathematics for Grades 7-12; and Science for Grades 7-12. Each of these curricula consists of self-instructional computer programs. Also included are teacher curriculum guides designed to help the teacher plan how to employ the appropriate software to achieve learning objectives in the computer assisted classroom.

Across Campus

Two sons of SVSU faculty members have been named winners in the prestigious Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition, sponsored annually by the Michigan Section of the Mathematical Association of America.

At an awards banquet February 27 at Lawrence Technological University in Detroit, Andrew Menard, 17, received a Gold Award and a \$1400 scholarship for his overall third place finish out of more than 16,000 high school contestants. Menard, the son of physics professor Albert Menard and a senior at Heritage High School, plans to attend the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Andrew Thaler, 16, won a Silver Award

and an \$850 scholarship for his sixth place finish in the competition. He is a junior at Arthur Hill High School and son of Robert J. Thaler, assistant professor of sociology.

A juried exhibit of artworks by Michigan women opened with a reception in the University Art Gallery Sunday, March 7. The display will be open throughout the month.

University Art Gallery Director Barron Hirsch was pleased with the "strong response" to the show, noting that 73 artists entered work, with more than 200 pieces submitted. The entries were juried by Carrie Anne Parks, associate professor of art at Alma College.

Parks, who is accomplished in both twoand three-dimensional work, selected a total of 51 works by 45 artists. Her judging took place Monday, March 1, and included selection of the "Best of Show" award-winning piece by Terry Basmadjian. Basmadjian is an adjunct professor of ceramics at SVSU.

"Awards of Merit" were presented to Julie Cook, Mary Ann Moss and Corinne Nelson.

"Women's Work is a very high quality show," Hirsch said. "I think the strength is partly in the area of sculpture, especially work in clay. The show is representative of the varied styles being used by artists in the mid-Michigan area."
