# **CIESIN President to Speak at Honors Convocation**

Dr. Roberta Balstad Miller, president and chief executive officer of the Consortium for International Earth Science Information Network (CIESIN), will be the Honors Convocation speaker at 4 p.m., Thursday, April 22, in the University Theatre.

Miller, who earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of Minnesota, will speak on "Public Policy and the Universities."

The author of City and Hinterland: A Case Study of Urban Growth and Regional Development, Miller has published numerous other articles on science policy and environmental change. She has conducted historical research in South Africa and has served as chairperson of the Human Interactions Working Group of the U.S. Global Change Research Plan. She has taught at the Catholic University of America, the University of Minnesota, Oberlin College and Hiram College.

Miller was appointed president of CIESIN in February of this year. She succeeds former astronaut Jack Lousma. Since 1984, Miller has served as director of the Division of Social and Economic Science for the National Science Foundation (NSF). She also currently is vice president of the International Social Science Council (ISSC) and vice chair of the ISSC's Committee on the Human Dimensions of Global Environmental Change Programme.

The assembly will recognize the accomplishments of 11 graduating seniors who completed and presented honors theses. These students maintained a grade point average of 3.4 or better throughout their college careers.

Others to be recognized include students graduating with honors, student members of Alpha Chi, members of departmental honors societies and those receiving special academic awards.

A musical prelude will be performed by the Collegium Musicum, and President Eric Gilbertson will open the program with a greeting to students. Following Dr. Miller's address, Dr. Jonathan Leonard, assistant professor of electrical engineering, will read the names of those being honored who are in attendance at the Convocation.

SVSU faculty and staff are invited to join in an honor guard near the entrance to the steps of the Theatre. Academic repalia, although not required for this ceremony, is available at the Bookstore for those who placed an order for commencement. In case of inclement weather, the entire processional will assemble inside the Theatre lobby.

Guests can greet Dr. Miller and congratulate students during a reception in the Theatre lobby following the ceremony.

# "Concert in St. Petersburg" to Get SVSU Homecoming Welcome

After a sparkling reception in Russia's former capital city, St. Petersburg, SVSU's Concert Choir, Chamber Choir and the Bay Chorale will present a Homecoming Concert at 8 p.m., Saturday, April 24, in the University Theatre.

"Concert in St. Petersburg" is expected to recreate the music and excitement that prompted four encores from an enthusiastic Russian audience when the combined choirs performed recently in the renowned Cappella Concert Hall.

"It was a beautiful hall with excellent acoustics," music professor Eric Nisula said when the choirs returned from the spring break concert appearance. "The choir was extremely well received by the Russian audience, particularly when it performed American jazz, The Battle Hymn of the Republic and a medley of beloved Russian melodies."

The Homecoming Concert will consist of three types of music. The first is traditional classical featuring *Motet No.* 6, "Praise Ye the Lord," by Johann Sebastian Bach. The second consists of four Byzantine chant compositions by anonymous composers that are traditional to the Russian Orthodox Church. Other selections include a work from Rachmoninoff's *All Night Vigil* and compositions by Tchaikowsky and Tschensnikoff.

During the intermission, refreshments, photographs and souvenirs of the St. Petersburg appearance will be available in the Theatre lobby.

The concert resumes with an all-American flavor, beginning with four vocal jazz selections, Just in Time, Here's That Rainy Day and Embraceable You by George Gershwin, topped off by Duke Ellington's It Don't Mean a Thing If It Ain't Got That Swing. Two old American anthems follow, I am the Rose of Sharon by Colonial New England composer William Billings and an arrangement of the southern folk hymn, What Wondrous Love is This. An old-time hymn sing follows with In the Garden and Leaning on the Everlasting Arms.

The concert continues with spirituals, Go Tell it on the Mountain, Swing Low Sweet Chariot, Every Time I Feel the Spirit and Amazing Grace. The combined choirs perform an arrangement of Battle Hymn of the Republic by Peter Wilhousky and round out the concert with a medley of Russian cabaret songs including Those Were the Days My Friend and Moscow Nights, accompanied by a mandolin, producing a "reasonable facsimile of a Russian balalaika."

Encore selections include professional entertainers from the choir singing music made famous by Elvis Presley and Jerry Lee Lewis, with the choirs joining in.

- · Sally Edgerton, associate professor of teacher education, with Melrita Westerlund. SVSU adjunct professor, conducted a workshop titled "Science, Young Children and Books" at a March 25 meeting in Grand Rapids of the Michigan Association for the Education of Young Children.
