SVSU Welcomes International Faculty, Students to Campus

Two visiting faculty will bring an international perspective to the classroom this year at SVSU. Teaching Chinese culture, traditions and literature is Jing Wang, from the Shanghai International Studies University in the People's Republic of China. Neil Gracie, a guest professor in the Department of Nursing, is from Ballarat University in Australia.

SVSU also is hosting 65 international students who are enrolled in fall semester courses. More than half are new to the University. The highest number of students (12) are here from Thailand; 10 come from Japan;

five from Pakistan; four each from France and India; while Taiwan, Spain and Canada sent three each. Two students arrived from Vietnam, Lebanon, Korea, Zimbabwe and China. The Netherlands, Columbia, Palestine, Ethiopia, Russia, Cyprus, Singapore, Sweden, Nepal, Turkey and Peru each are represented with one student.



Professional Profile

- Diane Brimmer, director of Student Life, was elected to the vice presidency of the Leadership Saginaw Alumni Association. Brimmer will assume the presidency for the 1994-95 year. Leadership Saginaw is a program sponsored by the Saginaw Chamber of Commerce to build community leaders.
- Eric De Vos, assistant professor of psychology, has been awarded a research grant from the Michigan State Foundation. The research, titled "The Mother's Sense of Place in Vertical and Horizontal Dimensions of Social Status as a Mediator of Risk for Prematurity," will examine individual differences in social status within a low-income sample in Saginaw. The project is part of a multidisciplinary research initiative through the Program in Epidemiology at MSU, and involves collaboration with Peter Vasilenko, director of research at Saginaw Cooperative Hospitals Inc. Several SVSU students will be employed by the project.
- Judith Kerman, dean of Arts and Behavioral Sciences, has had her poem titled "Letting the Bucket Down" published in issue number four (fall 1993) of the literary magazine *House Organ*, published in Lakewood, Ohio.
- Tirumale Ramesh, associate professor of electrical engineering, was awarded a Ph.D. degree from Oakland University. His dissertation, titled "Reconfigurable Flexibly-Coupled Multiprocessor for Parallel Computing," focuses on design and development of a SIMD/MIMD coupled multiprocessor system with communication reconfiguration capabilities.
- David Rayfield, professor of philosophy, has had two of his photographs selected for exhibition in "The Miniature: An All-Media Exhibition of Miniature Works," which runs Sept. 10-30 and is sponsored by the Traverse City Arts Council. Camus Does Asheville, a 23/4-inch-square silver gelatin print, received an honorable mention; and Again with the Roses!, a Polaroid transfer of the same size, received Best of Show. According to Associate Professor of Art Hideki Kihata, it is a remarkable achievement for a photograph to receive the top award at an all-media exhibit. The juror was Anthony Williams, professor of art at the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit.

Two other works by Rayfield, La Crista XVIII and La Crista XXIII, have been selected

- for exhibition in the 1993 Hoyt National Art Show, sponsored by the Hoyt Institute of Fine Arts in New Castle (PA). The juror for this show was Phyllis Kind, owner of the Phyllis Kind Gallery in New York City. The show opens Oct. 10 and closes Nov. 6.
- Suk Koo (Tom) Yun, professor of physics, was informed that Dr. Robert P. Marande, an SVSU physics graduate (class of '74), accepted a new position as chairman of the Mathematics and Physics Department at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science. The department has 28 faculty members. For many years, Marande was a professor and chairman of Physics Department at the Pennsylvania State University at Erie. Marande obtained his M.S. in physics from Wayne State University and his Ph.D. in physics (on liquid crystal) from Kent State University.
