Rhea Miller Concert Features The Percussion Group

The 1994-95 Rhea Miller Concert Series continues with a January 21 performance by **The Percussion Group.** The concert begins at 7:30 p.m. in the SVSU Theatre.

Al Otte, Jim Culley and Rusty Burge, faculty and ensemble-in-residence at the College-Conservatory of the University of Cincinnati, joined forces in 1979 to form The Percussion Group. They've been going strong ever since, and often are described as virtuosi of consummate artistry—percussionists who set the standards against which others are measured. Audiences love their intense, vigorous music. Their concerts elicit praise for their "command of every instrument, superb sense of timing and above all, their sensitive response to the expressive content of each work."

Recent appearances in the busy schedule of The Percussion Group include Alice Tully Hall, Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center and summer festivals in Poland. They have recorded for Opus One and CRI Records and for radio stations throughout Europe. Special projects this past season range from recording for CDCM in Dallas to performances with the Hong Kong City Dance Theatre.

Allen Otte, from Wisconsin, holds a bachelor's degree from Oberlin Conservatory and a master's degree from Northern Illinois University. After seven years as a founding and continuous member of the Blackearth Percussion Group, he founded The Percussion Group.

James Culley was born in Hamilton, Ohio. His degrees include a bachelor's from Oberlin Conservatory, a bachelor of arts degree in classics from Oberlin and a master's degree from the Eastman School of Music.

Russell Burge, a native of Boulder, Colorado, received his bachelor's degree from the Eastman School of Music and his master's degree from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory. He formerly was principal percussionist of the West Virginia Symphony and timpanist with the Columbus Pro Musica Chamber Concert.

The Rhea Miller Concert Series is funded through a generous endowment to bring outstanding contemporary musicians to SVSU. Miss Miller, who served for many years as Director of Music Education for the Saginaw Public Schools, attends each concert.

Artist Series to Feature Works by SVSU Faculty

The Saginaw Community Enrichment Commission will open its Artists Series '95 with an exhibit of artwork by SVSU faculty Sara Clark, Barron Hirsch, Hideki Kihata and Matthew Zivich. The exhibition will be on display from January 11-29 at the Andersen Enrichment Center. An opening reception is set for 5-7 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 29.

Sara Clark, a ceramic sculptor, received her Master in Fine Arts from Ohio University. She has exhibited nationally with recent shows in Minnesota and West Virginia. Her work uses abstract forms with playful surface ornamentation.

Barron Hirsch, a painter and printmaker, produces art based on Mexican folk themes. His brightly colored paintings contain musicians, mythical figures and city landscapes. Hirsch received his Master of Fine Arts from

Cornell University and has exhibited in Boston, New York, Washington and Detroit.

Photographer Hideki Kihata has exhibited throughout the United States. He has received a Michigan Council for the Arts Award and the Ferguson Award from California. He holds a Master of Fine Arts from the University of Cincinnati. He uses pinhole photography to create dream-like images of people.

Matthew Zivich creates sculptural objects that reflect the modern urban world. A painter as well as sculptor, he has received awards from the Flint Institute of Arts, the Bloomfield-Birmingham Art Association and the Midland Art Council. His Master of Fine Arts is from Indiana University.

Artists Series is made possible with the support of the Michigan Council for Art and Cultural Affairs and the Wickson-Link Memorial Foundation. It is a project established by the Saginaw Community Enrichment Commission giving area artists an opportunity to exhibit and sell their work.



- Men's Basketball: fell to 0-3 in GLIAC play after an 89-84 setback at Lake Superior State University over the weekend. Defense was a key factor as the Lakers connected on 63 percent from the floor and made 10 of 18 three-point shots. LSSU also had a 31-11 edge in free throw attempts. Brandon Fisher led SVSU in scoring with 18 points.
- Women's Basketball: dropped an 86-83 decision to LSSU, who are the No. 14-ranked team in NCAA Division II and the pre-season favorite to win the conference title. Three SVSU players fouled out of the game, forcing the Cardinals to play as many as three freshmen at one time. The loss is the third straight for SVSU, which travels to Northwood on Thursday and hosts Wayne State this Saturday.
