President of U.S./Japan Foundation is Wickson-Nickless Speaker

States/Japan Foundation, will deliver the 1995 Wickson-Nickless Distinguished Lecture in Business at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 29 in the SVSU Theatre.

In addition to presiding over the group formed to stress the importance of the relationship between the two economic superpowers, Bosworth is executive director of the Carnegie Foundation's National Commission on America and the New World. A consultant to several major American and foreign corporations, he is considered an expert and speaker on global economic and political issues—particularly in Asia, Europe and Latin America.

Born in Grand Rapids in 1939, Bosworth graduated from Dartmouth College in 1961. He went to work for the State Department in Washington, D.C. where he stayed until the late 1980s. He was assigned as Foreign Service economic/financial officer to various cities including Paris, Madrid and Panama. After a year's service under the White House Executive Exchange Program as international economist with Continental Bank of Chicago, he rejoined the State Department in 1974 as director of the Office of Fuels and Energy.


From 1979 until 1981, Bosworth was ambassador to Tunisia before being appointed ambassador to the Philippines. During his tenure, he played a key role in encouraging and monitoring the democratic elections of 1986 and advocated policy changes toward the administrations of past presidents Ferdinand Marcos and Corazon Aquino.

Bosworth is the third distinguished lecturer to take part in this series following CNN Business Correspondent Stuart Varney in 1992 and past Labor Secretary William Brock in 1993. Established in 1992, the endowed lectureship, honoring the late James E. Wickson and Allen E. Nickless, provides forums for the debate and study of contemporary events and issues that influence business policies and behavior.

Coordinated by the College of Business and Management, the lecture is free of charge.

Thylias Moss Featured Poet of *Voices* in the Valley

A frequently published University of Michigan professor will read from her works at the next "Voices in the Valley" session at 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 21 at the Saginaw Art Museum.

Thylias Moss, associate professor of English at U of M, has published numerous books, including several for children. Her poems and stories have appeared in periodicals and anthologies such as *The Boston Globe, The New York Times, The Michigan Quarterly Review* and *The Los Angeles Times*.

Moss is the recipient of many awards and honors for her work. I Want to Be was named the best children's book for 1993 by USA Today and The Detroit Free Press. The book also received starred reviews by Publisher's Weekly, School Library Journal and Kirkus Review.

Moss frequently lectures on poetry, often serves as a keynote speaker and has presented more than 100 readings from her works.

The series is supported by Poets and Writers, Inc. through a major grant from the Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest Fund, and by grants from Delta College and Second National Bank. Jesse Jackson Jr. to Visit SVSU

As a featured speaker during the 1988 Democratic National Convention, Jesse Jackson Jr. stirred the audience with an unforgettable introduction of his father, Reverend Jesse Jackson, as a candidate for President of the United States. The son of the controversial civil rights activist will discuss his plan to combat racism on campus and other topics at 7:30 p.m. Monday, March 27 in the SVSU Theatre.

Jesse Jackson Jr. has established a noteworthy record in his own right. He was a member of the U.S. delegation that sought to chart a course for the end of apartheid in South Africa and to establish diplomatic relations with Angola. He is a member of the Democratic National Committee, president of the "Keep Hope Alive" political action committee and vice president-at-large of Operation PUSH.

A graduate of St. Albans Episcopal High School in Washington, D.C., Jackson graduated magna cum laude from North Carolina A&T, where he earned a B.S. in management in 1987. In 1990 he graduated from the Chicago Theological Seminary with an M.A. in theology. He also holds a J.D. from the University of Illinois College of Law.

Jackson's appearance, which is sponsored by Program Board, is free to SVSU students. General admission is \$3.

Department of Music Presents Pair of Spring Concerts

Fresh from their spring break concert tour of Florence and northern Italy, the Saginaw Valley Chorale, SVSU Concert Choir and the Bay Chorale with the SVSU Early Music Collegium will repeat their international performances.

An 8 p.m. program on Saturday, April 1 in the Theatre will be repeated at 4 p.m. Sunday, April 2 at the First Presbyterian Church, 805 Center, Bay City.

The choral groups originally performed the programs as guests of the Tuscany Association of Choruses in northern Italy earlier this month. Stops in the tour included one in the coastal city of Follonica, another in Prato and a third in the Santa Maria Coverciano Church in Florence.

The program is divided into six sections. The first includes classics such as *Sanctus* by Franz Schubert and *O Mio Babbino Caro* by Giacomo Puccini. The second section features Renaissance Music of Italy, including *Echo la Primavera* by Francesco Landini and *Dolcissimo Ben Mio* by Orazio Vechhi.

The third section highlights vocal jazz, including an arrangement of the Beatles' song Blackbird and Just in Time by Julie Styne. A section devoted to American music features three old-time hymns, including Charles Gabriel's Since Jesus Came Into My Heart and Everytime I Feel the Spirit. Another section is devoted to Italian songs, with one more that includes Jerome Kern's Look for the Silver Lining, George Gershwin's Summertime and The Battle Hymn of the Republic.

The third annual "Music of the Renaissance" concert will be presented at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 4 in the Marshall Fredericks Sculpture Gallery. The program will feature music by Heinrich Isaac and anonymous masters of 15th and 16th century Spain.

The SVSU Early Music Ensemble along with the Collegium Musicum will perform. Instruments of the Medieval and Renaissance periods will be introduced and demonstrated.

"Simple but extremely fetching melodies make this music interesting to listen to," said Eric Nisula, professor of music.

Poets Await the Outcome of "An Evening with Ted Roethke" 8 p.m. Thursday, April 6



ix years have passed since "one of the largest poetry prizes in America" was last awarded to the deserving author of a book of poems. This year, however, American poets far and near are awaiting the decision of three judges to determine who will receive the 1995 "Theodore Roethke Poetry Award."

Presentation of the \$3,000 prize will be celebrated during "An Evening with Ted Roethke" at 8 p.m. Thursday, April 6 in the SVSU Theatre. The recipient will read selections from his or her awardwinning writings.

Former Roethke Poetry Award winners are Howard Nemerov, Donald Finkel, Robert Penn Warren, John Ciardi, Richard Hugo and Carolyn Kizer.

Usually presented once every three years, the award is named for the late Theodore Roethke, who was born May 25, 1908 in Saginaw. He attended Arthur Hill High School and in 1929 graduated with honors and a Phi Beta Kappa key from the University of Michigan. He did graduate work at Harvard and wrote nine books of poetry and one of prose. His poetry has been translated into 13 languages.

Among Roethke's prizes were two National Book Awards and the Pulitzer Prize. At the time of his death in August 1963 at the age of 55, he had won more prizes than any other American poet. He was given the regent's appointment as Poet in Residence at the University of Washington and awarded an honorary doctor of letters by the University of Michigan in 1962. He is buried in Saginaw.

Inaugurated in 1967, the prize is given to the author of an individual book of poems published in a specified period of three years, which would be 1992-94 for this year's prize. The recipient must be a living American poet (U.S. citizen) without regard to number of publications, age, sex, place of residence, style or type of poetry or choice of subject matter.

Judging this year's submissions are Naomi Shihab Nye of San Antonio, Texas; Susan Ludvigson of Rock Hill, South Carolina; and Cornelius Eady of New York City. Eady, an associate professor of English and director of creative writing and poetry at SUNY-Stony Ridge, will make the presentation to this year's award winner.



Sign Up Today for Community Corporate Challenge



SVSU Board of Control Reaffirms Public School Academy Policy

The SVSU Board of Control reaffirmed the policy it adopted last November and invited individuals or organizations to submit applications for the creation of Public School Academies (PSA). The University's policy statement on PSAs was discussed at the Board's Wednesday, March 15 meeting.

Board chairman Dr. Thomas Rush said SVSU is "ready to consider approving contracts for PSAs which will provide enhanced opportunities for elementary and secondary students to meet the objectives of Article 8 of the Michigan Constitution.

"We are prepared to approve contracts where it can be demonstrated that proposed PSAs can and will meet educational needs of students who are presently being underserved," Rush said.

"There are eleven criteria that applicants must meet to qualify for a contract with SVSU," according to Wayne Vasher, director of School/University Partnerships for SVSU, who coordinates the University's effort. "The criteria are simple, common sense requirements that an organization must meet if it intends to provide a quality education for young students," he said.

Board members learned that bids had been received from eight contractors for construction of Founder's Hall. Director of Engineering Services Steve Hocquard reported that bids were very competitive, with Wolgast Construction Inc of Freeland submitting the successful bid of \$1.26 million. Hocquard said construction could start by the end of April, with completion expected by January 1, 1996.

Walt Rathkamp, director of SVSU's

Regional Math and Science Center, explained the Center's programs for area K-12 schools. He distributed information packets and discussed Projects SOLVE and MOLVE, as well as SEMS+, noting that approximately 50 school districts have participated in one or more of the Center's programs since its inception.

"The Center's budget is now about \$300,000," he said. "Our approach has been to identify needs and provide help."

In other action the Board:

Approved a resolution modifying the General Fund operating budget for the current fiscal year. The budget is reviewed and modified periodically throughout each fiscal year to reflect changes in various categories. The revisions adopted Wednesday reduced expenditures by approximately one quarter of one percent to balance lower than anticipated tuition and fee revenue for winter semester.

Authorized expanding the Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Gallery Board from 11 to 15 members. Present Gallery board members will identify and recommend individuals for the newly-created positions.

Appointed George Ward, Donna Roberts and Elias Escobedo to serve as a nominating committee to recommend candidates for 1995-96 Board officers.
