SVSU Honors Eight for Outstanding Contributions

Prominent Bad Axe banker and SVSU Board of Fellows Chairman Ernest E. Paulick was awarded SVSU's highly coveted Distinguished Service Medallion during the Sixth Annual All-University Awards Banquet, held April 7 in the Arbury Fine Arts Center. The award recognizes Paulick as a leader who has demonstrated exemplary service to the University and his community.

Paulick joined Signature Bank in Bad Axe in 1984 as senior vice president and director. Promoted to executive vice president and director in 1985, he has provided imaginative and energetic leadership to the bank, the community it serves and to SVSU.

A member of the SVSU Board of Fellows since 1989, Paulick is a member of the SVSU Foundation's Annual Fund Committee and is active in promoting and representing the University in Huron and Tuscola Counties.

Known to his friends as Ernie, his initiative in 1992 led to the creation of a partnership

effort between the University and Signature Bank and establishment of the SVSU Visa Card Program.

Active in his community, Paulick is a member of the Bad Axe Rotary International, the Verona Hills Golf Club, the Grindstone-Port Hope Sportsman Club, a member and past chairman of the Compliance Committee of the Michigan Bankers Association, a member of the St. Andrews (Benevolent) Society of Detroit and a Drum Major with the Michigan Scottish Pipes and Drums of Bloomfield Hills. Paulick and his family live in Bad Axe.

Those who attended SVSU's 30th Anniversary Celebration and a variety of athletic and social events are familiar with Ernie's skill as a pig roaster and bagpipe player.

At the banquet a number of University faculty and staff members were recognized for outstanding achievement and dedicated service.

Professor Bradley J. Miller to Speak at SVSU Honors Convocation

Bradley J. Miller, recipient of the 1994 Landee Teaching Excellence Award and 1995 MAGB Award, will be the principal speaker for SVSU's Honors Convocation at 4 p.m. Friday, April 21 in the Theatre. His address is titled "Never Eat Anything Bigger Than Your Head."

Miller holds a B.A. in political science from Michigan State University, a master's in public administration with a specialty in public finance from Wayne State University and a Ph.D. from the University of Kentucky.

Miller joined the SVSU faculty as an associate professor in 1989 and was promoted to full professor in 1994. He has served as chair of the Political Science Department since 1992 and as vice president of the Faculty Association since the fall of 1994. Miller previously had served on the faculties of the University of Missouri, Columbia and Northeastern University in Boston.

Heading the list of faculty honorees is Stephen S. Lawrence, assistant professor of chemistry, who was selected to receive the prestigious Landee Teaching Excellence Award. The Earl L. Warrick Award for Excellence in Research went to Tirumale K. Ramesh, associate professor of electrical engineering. The House Family Award for Teacher Impact was presented to V. Emilio Castañeda, professor of modern foreign languages.

Lawrence, who has been a member of the SVSU faculty since 1992, holds a B.A. in chemistry from the University of Missouri-St. Louis where in 1989 he also earned a Ph.D. in analytical/physical chemistry.

Lawrence is the principal designer of SVSU's innovative chemistry degree option in environmental chemistry. He serves as research scientist with the Saginaw Valley Research and Development Corporation and has conducted proprietary research in conjunction with Omni Tech International, Ltd.

In addition to having published several scholarly papers and delivering a number of addresses, presentations and papers, Lawrence involves students in research projects and encourages them to present their results at regional and national conferences. He serves as faculty representative for "Project Get Set," has participated as a judge for the 1993 Tuscola County Academic Games and as a finalist judge of the Saginaw County Science and Engineering Fair.

Ramesh has amassed a remarkable scholarly record over the past five years while at the same time earning his Ph.D. in computer science and engineering from Oakland University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Bangalore University in Bangalore, India, and an M.S. in electrical engineering from Mississippi State University.

Ramesh has done extensive research in the field of microelectronics, concentrating on parallel processing with emphasis on reconfigurable parallel computer architectures for scientific and engineering applications. He also is noted for his research on VLSI (Very Large Scale Integrated) circuit design issues in parallel processing computer systems. He is one of the key contributors to the development of test chips and circuit libraries for VLSI technology that are widely used today in many VLSI design tools at major academic and non-academic institutions.

Ramesh's research papers have been published extensively, with more than 20 of his scholarly papers in the proceedings of major national and international conferences and journals. A bibliography of major publications in the last five years in reconfigurable architectures includes three of Ramesh's research papers. Compiled by Hitachi Ltd. of Japan, this bibliography has been included in a special issue, titled "Dynamic Reconfigurable Architectures," of the *Journal of Parallel Processing Letters*.

Faculty members who have a major impact on the academic or personal lives of graduating seniors majoring in business or the humanities may be nominated for the House Family Award. V. Emilio Castañeda was nominated by a student whose loss of a loved one caused him to seriously consider dropping out of school.

In his nominating letter, the student wrote, "Dr. Castañeda's support and caring at that particular time in my life helped me to go on...he is without a doubt a caring, supportive human being and a very good friend."

Castañeda has been a member of the SVSU faculty since 1982. He holds a B.A. from the Instituto de Estudios Superiores in Mexico, an M.A. in Spanish-Latin American Studies from St. Louis University and a Ph.D. in Spanish and Portuguese from the University of New Mexico.

Staff members receiving accolades include Fred Porterfield, public information director, who received the Ruben Daniels Community Service Award, SVSU's highest recognition of community service and involvement. The Terry

The Michigan Delta Chapter of Alpha Chi National College Honor Society will induct 49 new members during ceremonies at 4 p.m. Sunday, April 23 in Doan Center.

The SVSU Chapter is one of more than 300 at four-year colleges and universities across the country. Since its installation in 1986, more than 500 junior and senior students will have been inducted locally. Gretchen Mooningham serves as faculty advisor for the chapter.

To be admitted to Alpha Chi, faculty members from various departments nominate students whose grade point average is 3.50 or better and who are ranked in the top 10 percent of their major field of study. Nominations are based on "intellectual capacity, breadth of general knowledge, ability to communicate, intellectual curiosity, classroom contribution and creativity," according to Mooningham.

Since Alpha Chi's founding in 1922, more than 200,000 students have been admitted nationally to the society whose purpose is to promote academic excellence and exemplary character.

New York Poet Wins Roethke Award

Kimiko Hahn, an assistant professor of creative writing and literature at Queens College (CUNY), was awarded the 1995 Theodore Roethke Poetry Award during an April 6 presentation in the University Theatre.

Hahn received the award for her book of poetry titled *Earshot*, published in 1992 by Hanging Loose Press. An earlier work titled *Airpocket* was published by Hanging Loose Press in 1990. She is waiting publication of a new book, *The Unbearable Heart*, next fall by Kaya Productions.

A recipient of fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts and the New York Foundation for the Arts, Hahn earned a bachelor of arts from the University of Iowa where she participated in an undergraduate writer's workshop. She holds a master's degree in Japanese literature from Columbia University. She lives with her husband and two daughters in Brooklyn, New York.

As the 1995 recipient of the \$3,000 prize, "one of the largest poetry prizes in America," Hahn joins a list of distinguished poets who are previous Roethke Prize winners, including Howard Nemerov, Donald Finkel, Robert Penn Warren, John Ciardi, Richard Hugo and Carolyn Kizer.

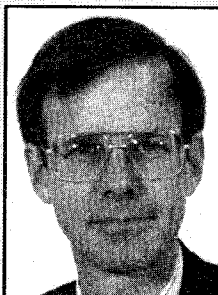

Porterfield is a charter member and four-year chairperson of the Saginaw Community Youth Commission/United Way of Saginaw County.

He has been actively involved in a number of voluntary and quasi-governmental endeavors, including service as vice chair of the Board of Directors of the Saginaw-Bay Substance Abuse Service Commission, a member of the Saginaw Community Corrections Advisory Board, a member of the Evaluation Advisory Committee of the Michigan Supreme Court Community Dispute Resolution Program, and as local television host for the United Negro College Fund.

Garcia has been a member of the University staff since September 1980 when she was hired as a library clerk. In 1985 she transferred to Evening Services where she serves as office coordinator.

Active on campus as well as in the community, Garcia regularly volunteers for campus events, is a board member of the Saginaw Valley 4-Cs, served as editor for *Cardinal Sins*, was Staff Member of the Month for June 1991, has had her poetry published in the *Green River Review* and had an article appear in *The Detroit Magazine*.

Science & Math Center Established

President Gilbertson has announced the establishment of the Center for Science and Mathematics Education at SVSU and appointed Walter R. Rathkamp as executive director of the Center. His appointment is effective September 1.

The Center will provide a more coordinated front for K-12 teachers in science and mathematics, according to Robert S.P. Yien, vice president for academic affairs.

"Dr. Rathkamp will be responsible for all grant-supported mathematics and science education programs and will work closely with academic deans and department chairpersons to enhance our education outreach to elementary and secondary schools in the East Central Region in Michigan," Yien said. Rathkamp will report directly to Yien on this assignment.

The mother of two daughters, Garcia lives in Saginaw with her husband Jim Geistman, a lecturer in the SVSU English Department.

An avid swimmer who works out regularly in the Ryder Center pool, Braddock coached the University's soccer club for several years before the program began intercollegiate play in 1994. He also started a women's soccer club.

A member of the SVSU faculty since 1971, Braddock rose from instructor to full professor by 1980. He served as chair of the Department of History from 1974 to 1976 and again from 1985 to 1987. He was an assistant to the vice president for academic affairs from 1987 through 1989, was director of International Programs from 1989 through 1991 and assistant dean of the College of Arts and Behavioral Sciences from 1991 through 1993.

The 1990 winner of the Landee Teaching Excellence Award and the 1987 SVSU Faculty Association Service Award, Braddock and his wife, Sarah, who coordinates SVSU's Foreign Language Laboratory and Media Center, live in Midland.

An adjunct faculty member since 1990, Ribble is a 1982 magna cum laude graduate from SVSU with a B.A. in English. She subsequently earned a master's degree in mass communication from Michigan State University. In addition to her work at SVSU, she is a lecturer in speech communication and academic coordinator for broadcasting and telecommunications at Delta College.

Along with freshman-level writing courses, Ribble teaches Advanced Composition, American Literature and Literary Analysis. She also works with the Department of Communication and Theatre at SVSU. Students praise Ribble for her availability and willingness to work with them outside the classroom.

Active in the community, Ribble has participated with "CROP Walk" as a steering committee member and liaison person, with "Hunger Watch" as a project interviewer, as a board of directors member for the Saginaw Hunger Coalition, as a consultant to "Created for Caring" and as a member of the board of directors of the Bay County Substance Abuse Coalition. She and her children live in Bay City.

Forty-nine faculty and staff members also were given recognition for providing between 10 and 25 years of dedicated service to the University.

Founders Hall

GROUND BREAKING

Architectural drawings have been approved, a construction contract has been awarded, an access drive and parking area have been developed. The next step—a groundbreaking ceremony signaling the start of construction work on Founders Hall—is scheduled for 9 a.m. Tuesday, April 25.

Financed by private donations, the \$1.5 million building will be located on the north side of College Drive east of Pine Grove Apartments. A free-standing structure, Founders Hall will be a blend of wood, stone and glass materials enclosing an auditorium with seating capacity of approximately 120 to 140.

When completed in December of this year, pedestrian access from the main campus will be across a footbridge over an adjacent creek. Auto traffic to Founders Hall will be along the west side of parking lot "F," which was expanded in 1994 to provide additional parking spaces for students and visitors to the new building.

Development of Founders Hall originally was approved by the Board of Control in December 1993. A year later the Board increased the authorization to construct and equip Founders Hall to \$1.5 million. The increase was approved when it was determined that cost for construction of the 5,500 square foot facility was greater than originally anticipated. Plans underwent some material changes and the project was re-bid.

Designed to be the site of group discussions, poetry readings, lectures, debates, weddings, memorial services, honor society inductions, forums and similar activities, Founders Hall plans received special attention from acoustical experts because it also will be used as a musical recital hall.

Dow • Howell • Gilmore Associates, Inc. of Midland are the architects for the project. Wolgast Construction, Inc. of Freeland is the general contractor.

- **Baseball:** added four victories to their season total over the weekend, defeating Northwood University 5-1, 2-1 on Saturday and 2-1, 5-2 on Sunday. The sweep leaves the Cardinals with a 8-2 GLIAC mark, 20-9 overall.

- **Softball:** picked up their first GLIAC victory in the second game of a home double header with Lake Superior State University on Saturday. After giving up seven homers in a 7-5 loss in the opening game, the Cardinals scratched out a come-from-behind 2-1 win in the nightcap. The Cardinals stand at 1-5 in the GLIAC, 12-14 overall.

- **Track:** swept the Alma Invitational Saturday, with the men scoring 155 points to finish on top of the 11-school field, while the women totalled 200½ points in running away with their title. The teams will compete this Friday and Saturday in the SVSU Invitational. Events begin at 3 p.m. on Friday and at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday at Morley Field.

- **Golf:** finished seventh in the Ferris State University Invitational during the weekend. SVSU as a team shot a 322, with Tony Daggett leading SVSU with rounds of 77-76 during the two-day tournament. The team competes this Friday and Saturday at the Tri-State University (IN) Invitational.
