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

"Empty Bowls" Workshop on October 21

n opportunity to be creative and contribute to a worthy cause will be available to the SVSU community on Saturday, Oct. 21 when the Art Department hosts a bowl making workshop in Arbury Fine Arts Center.

The workshop is part of an international project titled "Empty Bowls" that fights hunger. Bowls crafted at the workshop will be sold in March at the Valley Festival of the Fine Arts.

Last year, \$1,300 was raised for Hidden Harvest, a project of the Saginaw Community Foundation and the Good Neighbor Mission. In its first nine months of operation, Hidden Harvest rescued 76 tons of food—enough to feed a family of four three meals a day, seven



day a week, for more than 23 years. In Saginaw alone, more than 80,000 meals a month are served to the needy—70 percent of whom are children under the age of 18.

Workshop participants do not need experience using a potter's wheel. Deadline for reservations is **Thursday**, **Oct. 12**. To make an appointment, call the Fine Arts faculty secretary at ext. 4159.


English Faculty Host Elementary Students for "Manuscript Day"

The efforts of several faculty in the SVSU English Department will result in some 150 students in grades 4 through 6 visiting campus on Saturday, Oct. 14.

Mary Harmon and Sally Cannon, assistant professors of English, are working together to sponsor "SVSU Manuscript Day."

The young authors will work with SVSU faculty and about 50 SVSU students enrolled in "Teaching the Art of Writing" (English 380) to draft and polish manuscripts that will be assembled into a booklet. In addition to planned reading and writing activities, the students will have opportunities to listen to a professional storyteller, watch a clown or puppeteer, or browse among paperback books on display by a local bookseller.

The book sale, which will be optional for the students, is being organized by English faculty members Ruth Sawyers and Janice Wolff. Also during the day, Kay Harley will present a workshop for parents and teachers as part of the Saginaw Valley National Writing Project.

Board of Control Approves Modified Parking Fines, Authorizes Amendment to Gallery Agreement

At its regular meeting October 2, SVSU's Board of Control approved a proposed schedule of parking fines that reduces some fees and raises others.

A sliding scale has been created for failure to display a valid parking permit. The first offense during each academic year will cost \$2. The fine rises to \$5 the second time the permit is missing and to \$10 for any subsequent offenses in this category.

The reduced fees for first and second offenses apply only to those who possess a valid permit, but don't have it displayed when they park in a restricted lot. Those who have not purchased a parking permit will be subject to the \$10 for all violations of the permit display regulation.

Fines for parking or driving on campus sidewalks have been raised from \$5 to \$10. All other fines remain the same, including the \$50 charge for illegally parking in a handicapped zone.

In requesting Board authorization to sign a second amendment to the agreement between SVSU and the Marshall Fredericks family, President Gilbertson explained that the Gallery is preparing to enter another phase of development. The amendment will permit the University to accept another sizable donation of Fredericks' work.

"We are just delighted about the Fredericks' continued interest in SVSU," Gilbertson said. "This campus is becoming the principal repository for Marshall Fredericks' work."

The proposed donation is about equal in size to the collection already held by SVSU. Like the earlier acquisitions, the collection will include sculptures, molds, models, tools and archival materials.

Gilbertson said the donation may lead to future expansion of the Fredericks Gallery, which would be funded privately.

Board members heard a report from Registrar Paul Saft detailing fall semester enrollment. Saft noted that new records were set with 7,300 students registering for 70,491 credits.

"This is the second year that the number of enrolled students was over 7,000 and the first year to exceed 70,000 credits," Saft said. The freshman enrollment of 807 also set a record, he said.

In other action, the Board passed resolutions of appreciation for George E. Ward and Napoleon Lewis Sr. Members approved granting of an honorary degree to M. Madaiah, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Mysore (India).

They also received and accepted the annual financial audit and the federal awards audit for the 1994-95 fiscal year. "The auditors gave the records a very thorough examination," said Board member Robert Vitito. "It was a very good report; there were no problems and it was a very clean report."

Concluding the open meeting, Board members heard a presentation by SVSU's Department of Public Safety.
