Stephen Lawrence to deliver Convocation address

tephen S. Lawrence, recipient of the 1995 Landee Teaching Excellence Award, will be the principal speaker for SVSU's Honors Convocation at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, April 18 in the University Theatre. His address is titled "Three Words."

Lawrence has been a faculty member at SVSU since 1992. He serves as Chair of the Health Professions Advisory Committee, faculty advisor to SVSU's nationally acclaimed Science Club, member of several university committees, faculty mentor for many student researchers, and a consultant/collaborator for the Chemistry Departments at Temple University and the University of Detroit-Mercy.

One graduate of the Honors Program, Michele L. Blaylock, will be acknowledged during the convocation. She has maintained a G.P.A. of 3.40 or higher and has completed and presented an honors thesis, titled "Tumor Suppressor Genes and the Loss of Heterozygosity in Cancer Cells." Her thesis advisor was Professor Charles Pelzer.

Others whose academic records will be acclaimed are students graduating with honors as well as graduating members of the SVSU Chapter of the Alpha Chi National Scholastic Honor Society, members of departmental honors societies and those receiving special academic awards. A reception follows the ceremony in the Theatre lobby.

Sheriff McIntyre selected as 1996 Distinguished Alum

homas E. McIntyre, Saginaw County sheriff, has been selected as recipient of SVSU's Distinguished Alumni Award for 1996. Sheriff McIntyre will be recognized at the May 4 Commencement ceremony.

A native of the St. Charles area, McIntyre graduated from SVSU in 1971 with a Bachelor of Arts degree, majoring in sociology. "My first goal was to become a teacher," McIntyre said. "While teaching part time for the Chesaning and St. Charles school districts, I realized my true calling was law enforcement."

He began working as a patrol officer in Chesaning. In November 1972 McIntyre accepted full time employment with the Saginaw County Sheriff Department as a deputy and began working through the ranks. By 1977 he was promoted to Lieutenant in charge of the jail, and in 1980 he achieved the rank of Captain of the Road Patrol.

In 1979 McIntyre became only the second

officer from the Saginaw County Sheriff Department to graduate from the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. Nomination and acceptance to the international academy is considered an honor, and McIntyre went on to become president of the Michigan Chapter of the FBI National Academy Associates in 1989.

Sheriff McIntyre has compiled an outstanding record of service to his church, department, community and country. Among his civic activities are service on the Salvation Army Board, the Chamber of Commerce, the Township Board of Appeals, Kiwanis Club, the Valley Food Bank, Michigan Sheriff's Association and his local Deputy Sheriff's Association.

McIntyre and his wife, Kathy, are the parents of two children: Ann, a 1995 graduate of SVSU who teaches at Saginaw High; and Kevin, who works at Standard Electric and is a part-time student at SVSU.

SVSU wins AOTA award

SVSU is the recipient of the 1996 American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) Professional-level Student Membership Award. The \$250 award and a plaque will be presented at the AOTA National Conference Annual Business Meeting in Chicago.

Two student membership awards are presented, including one award for the Occupational Therapy Program and the other for the Occupational Therapy Assistant Program with the highest membership in the American Student Committee of the Occupational Therapy Association (ASCOTA).

This year's award was a tie between St. Ambrose University, Iowa, and SVSU. Both SVSU programs are under the direction of Alfred G. Bracciano and have 100 percent student membership in ASCOTA.

Motivational speaker to address SVSU audience

Jimmy Cabrera, a certified speaking professional (CSP), will present a motivational talk at 7 p.m. Wednesday, April 24 in the SVSU Theatre. His appearance is being co-sponsored by Project Pride and SVSU. Admission is free of charge.

Among the topics Cabrera offers are "Mastering Change in Your Life and Career," "Diversity is Our Future: Maximize and Embrace Our Commonalities," "Self-Esteem for Youth," and "Mastering the Discipline for Persuasion." During the past 12 years, Cabrera has spoken to more than one million people, including some 200,000 students of all ages.


A native of Amherst, Texas, Cabrera, 51, is a consultant, trainer and youth motivator in addition to being a professional speaker. He has produced a series of motivational cassette tape albums, including "Mastering the Disciplines of Persuasion and Sales," "Closing Sales," "B.U.I.L.D.—Success Through the Values of Excellence," "Find Your Niche or Stay in a Ditch," and "Here Comes the Sales Trainers."

Cabrera received the CSP designation in 1989 from the National Speakers Association (NSA). The highest-rated speaker at several conferences, he was a top sales person (selected from 10,000 individuals); a manager of the year; a Champion of the Year by Champions Ltd. of Scottsdale, Arizona; NSA of Houston's Member of the Year; and a recipient of the John Wolfe Award for Speaker of the Year in 1992. He is active in the Houston NSA, having served as the organization's president in 1985, 1986 and 1992.

SVSU receives endowment for international business

The Harvey Randall Wickes Foundation has pledged \$1.25 million to fund an endowed chair in international business. The contribution will enable the University to bring to the campus and community an individual widely recognized for his or her research or professional accomplishments.

The Harvey Randall Wickes Endowed Chair in International Business honors one of SVSU's founders who was a business and community leader in Saginaw. The Wickes Foundation has provided generous support to the institution throughout its history. One of the first campus classroom buildings and the sports

stadium renovated in 1990 bear Wickes' name, recognizing his significant personal and financial contributions.

Through the endowed chair, SVSU will seek to further internationalize its business curriculum by engaging a person with expertise in international trade. In addition to teaching, the endowed chair holder also will serve as a resource to regional business and economic development organizations.

Professional Profile

- Gary M. Lange, assistant professor of biology, was elected vice chair of the Zoology Section for the 1996-97 academic year at this year's annual meeting of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts & Letters. Elections occurred during the business meeting of the Zoology Section held March 1 at Alma College.
- Elaine Stephens, professor of teacher education, co-authored an article titled "School/ University Literacy Partnership for Authentic Learning" (*Michigan Reading Journal*, Winter 1996) with Kathy Couillard and Michelle Kulas, public school classroom teachers. Both Couillard and Kulas earned their M.A.T. degrees from SVSU. The article describes the collaborative efforts of Stephens, Couillard and Kulas to foster the literacy development of children in first and third grade classrooms while also providing undergraduate students in SVSU's elementary education program with school-based experiences.
- Elaine Stephens and Jean Brown, professors of teacher education, were invited on April 4 to share their experiences as co-authors and the books they have written with Saginaw Township elementary teachers interested in teaching writing.
