SVSU marked the graduation of its fifth class of students from the Taiwan M.B.A. pro-




gram with Commencement ceremonies on Thursday, Aug. 8 in Founders Hall (left). Sixteen students from Taiwan (Republic of China) received their diplomas and were inducted into the SVSU Alumni Association (right). Shyamalendu (Sam) Sarkar, professor

of economics, presented the address in which he praised the people of Taiwan for their perseverance and industriousness today and throughout their history. The first Taiwan M.B.A. course was taught in Taipei, Taiwan, during May 1991, and the first class graduated in December 1992.

- Diane Boehm, director of the writing program, gave a presentation titled "Adapting Other People's Models to Our Own College Culture: A WPA Introduces Student Writing Associates" at the annual Writing Program Administrators Conference at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, August 1-4. The presentation highlighted the development and unique characteristics of the Writing Associates Program at SVSU.
- Gayle Koehler, assistant director for special projects in the Office of Information Services, has a one-woman show at the Saginaw Township Hall, awarded to her by Art in Public Places. On exhibit are past works and new paintings from her studies in Monet's Gardens, Giverny, France. The show runs from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays through the end of August.
- Michael Panhorst, director of the Marshall Fredericks Sculpture Gallery, has been accepted for the Leadership Midland program for this fall. He will participate in a training session in October 1996.
- David K. Pugalee, assistant professor of teacher education, had an article titled "Meeting Challenges in the Teaching of Algebra" published in *Current Issues in Middle Level Education* (Spring 1996; vol. 5, no. 1). The journal is a nationally refereed publication of Professors of Middle Level Education. The article identified three challenges in the teaching of algebra based on research with students who recently had completed a one-year course in algebra at the middle school level. The article offered suggestions for the classroom teacher to consider in effectively addressing these challenges.
- Tirumale Ramesh, professor of electrical engineering, has received a grant of \$4,500 from the Michigan Space Grant Consortium (MSGC) for a proposal titled "Simulated Integrated Computer Technology for Space Systems." The focus of the project is to build a computer simulation model to demonstrate the function of a spacecraft attitude control system and integrate simulation and Internet technologies. The grant is matched by the SVSU Office of Outreach Coordinator for Science and Engineering and is supported by NASA under the Higher Education Program of MSGC. Some initial results of the project will be presented at the First Annual Conference of MSGC, September 20-21 at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.


- Patrick Beyer, manager of custodial operations, on the loss of his father, Joseph, who passed away July 23.

• Football—the Cardinals have been picked to finish third in the Midwest Intercollegiate Football Conference (MIFC) pre-season football coaches poll. Ferris State received the highest number of first place votes, while Grand Valley State University was picked for second. The Cardinals open at Wayne State on Sept. 7, then host Northwood in the 22nd annual Axe Bowl game on Sept. 14. SVSU has 21 starters back from a team that ended up 7-3 and tied for third place in the MIFC last season. Wide receiver, kickoff and punt return specialist Chucky Davis, center Aaron Grace and defensive end Matt Barghahn were chosen as pre-season All-Americans. Jeff Klopf is expected to start at quarterback this year.
