oncert goers can enjoy baroque music performed by *Ensemble Ouabache* at SVSU as part of the Rhea Miller Concert Series. The group will perform at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 12 in the SVSU Theatre. This performance is open to the public and admission is free of charge.

Ensemble Ouabache performs music on period instruments, including baroque violin, baroque cello and harpsichord. Guest Steven Rickards, countertenor, is among today's most accomplished vocal artists.

Thomas Gerber, harpsichord, teaches at Fairview Music Studios, Indianapolis. A graduate of Hillsdale College, he holds master's degrees in harpsichord from Indiana University and in piano from Ball State University.

Barbara Kallaur, baroque flute, is professor

of music at Indiana University's School of Music where she teaches baroque flute. In Indianapolis she teaches at Fairview Studios and St. Richard's School.

Christopher Verrette, baroque violin, recently joined Tafelmusik, Canada's 18th-century orchestra. His teachers included James Buswell and baroque violinist Stanley Ritchie at Indiana University, where Verrette received his bachelor's degree.

Ann Marie Morgan, viola da gamba and

baroque cello, serves on the Early Music faculties of the Peabody Conservatory, the Interlochen Arts Camp and the Oberlin Baroque Performance Institute.

Rickards is the first countertenor to earn a Master of Music degree in vocal performance from Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana. He received his artist diploma in 1979. In 1981 Rickards was awarded a Fulbright-Hayes Scholarship and a Rotary International Grant for continued studies at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London.



Professional Profile

- Barron Hirsch, professor of art, has a oneperson exhibition of his work in the Rankin Fine Arts Center Gallery of Ferris State University through November 1. The exhibition, composed of 22 paintings, will include pieces from the Mexican series as well as works from the new Chicago series that explores images of contemporary urban America. On October 24 at 7 p.m., Hirsch will give a public lecture on the origins and development of his ideas.

SVSU social work program accreditation renewed

National accreditation of SVSU's social work program has been renewed for an eight-year period. The reaccreditation by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) was announced by Ann Rae, chair of the social work department.

The continuing accreditation was received following a self-study report prepared by department personnel and a site visit by a CSWE team. SVSU's social work program, which leads to the Bachelor of Social Work (B.S.W.) degree, first was certified by CSWE in 1983 and received reaccreditation in 1989.

Graning, Rosier artwork to be displayed in University Art Gallery

The October 2-30 exhibit in the University Art Gallery will feature complimentary works by two artists. Paintings by Robert Rosier and Ken Graning express the theme, "Landscape: Defining the Environment."

"Robert Rosier's painting deals with landscape and people," said Gallery Director Barron Hirsch. The Graning display also focuses on landscapes, but from a different perspective. "A painter and illustrator, Ken Graning has spent many years as an artist in the high pressure world of commercial design," Hirsch said. "Landscape has become a major subject in his diverse portfolio and this exhibit will concentrate on his achievements in this area."

An associate professor at Alma College, Rosier has served as chairperson of the art department and director of the Flora Kirsch Beck Gallery. He supervises the curatorial care of the permanent collection and is responsible for publishing the *Pine River Anthology*.

Now working in his own Bloomfield Hills studio, Graning has produced artwork for national clients including CBS Fox Videos, Ford Motor Company and General Motors. A graduate of the Chouinard Art Institute in Los Angeles, Graning learned to master both tradition realist styles and experimental expressionist techniques. He has taught illustration at Detroit's Center for Creative Studies.
