Levin promotes literacy program at SVSU

Students in Jesse Donahue's "Gender and Politics" course had a rare opportunity recently to quiz a United States senator on legislative issues that also have been the topic of class discussions.

Donahue, an assistant professor of political science, arranged a visit to campus by Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., March 26. Levin was in the midst of a 20-school, two-week statewide tour to generate support for a literacy program proposed last fall by President Clinton.

"America Reads" is a nationwide initiative to wipe out childhood illiteracy by the year 2000. To accomplish the goals of the program, one million volunteers will be recruited to serve as reading tutors in schools. Universities nationwide are participating in this effort by contributing up to half of the increase in their 1997-98 federal financial aid allocation to the College Work Study program.

At SVSU, that translates into at least 17 students who will have an opportunity to participate in the project.


"This is an important endeavor for our nation and for the Saginaw Valley region," said President Gilbertson of the America Reads program. "This unique cooperative venture provides us with another opportunity to serve our community by helping our citizens to be able to read."

Since January the University has been developing strategies to identify students who would have an interest in tutoring children eight years of age or younger. One model that is being explored is the involvement of students in the College of Education who would be able to gain experience tutoring the students one-on-one or in classroom settings.

SVSU officials involved in organizing the recruitment of tutors expect to select students by mid-summer so that training can be completed by the start of the fall 1998 school year. The amount of time each tutor would work each week is expected to be comparable to the requirements for an average Work Study position.

Since President Clinton originally announced this initiative, more than 130 colleges nationwide have committed to the cause.

Area students among top achievers on math exam

Some 300 students from middle and junior high schools in the Saginaw Valley region have achieved high scores on the American Junior High School Mathematics Examination (AJHSME).

"Overall, Michigan's level of participation jumped from 12,867 in 1995 to 15,051 this year, nearly a 17 percent increase," said David B. McCloy, teacher specialist coordinator for the Center for Mathematics and Science Education at SVSU. He said the increase in participation is due to efforts by directors of Michigan's mathematics and science centers to promote the exam and, in some cases, schools that pay registration fees for the students.

Results of two levels of achievement were announced. The National Honor Roll includes all students with scores of 20 or higher, which represents the top one or two percent of all participants. The Michigan Honor roll includes students with scores of 16 or higher, which places them in the top five or six percent of all Michigan participants. The national average was 9.88 (out of a possible score of 25), and the Michigan average was 9.34.

Campus campaign continues to receive contributions to the Campaign for Distinction


Contributions to the Campaign for Distinction are mounting, with nearly 90 University employees who have pledged or given cash support as of March 28.
