Born in an environment of music,

Chatteriee had his initial training in vocal music from his mother Smt. Rama Chatterjee. He subsequently was initiated into the art of sitar playing by his father, Sri Prabir Chatterjee, who later took him to the late Padmabhusan Nikhil Banerjee.

Acceptance of the Guru followed years of test and trials. For well over 12 years, Partha Chatterjee intensively trained under the sheltering wings of his master. He continues

Chatterjee has performed publicly since 1980 through out India and abroad. Since 1982, various Western organizations have invited him annually to perform and teach

Indian music. Chatterjee has traveled extensively in Europe and the United States. He was a participant in the Festival of India in Switzerland in 1987.

Parking, athletic passes available



Board Resolution Amends Campus Clean Indoor Air Policy

The Saginaw Valley State University Board of Control on Monday, Aug. 11, amended the University's Clean Indoor Air Policy. The policy was revised to further eliminate areas of smoking on campus, specifically private offices. According to the amendment, smoking has become less of an issue since the adoption of the policy in March 1978 (revised in February 1989).

With this revision, individuals no longer may smoke in their private offices — whether or not they share the office with another faculty or staff member.

Changes in the policy also include a revision to prohibit smoking in all state and University vehicles. This is a change from the previous policy that allowed smoking in the vehicles, as long as any other passengers in the vehicle did not object.

In other Board action:

The Freedom of Information Act Compliance Policy was amended to provide for an appeals process. The policy now outlines cause for appeal and the process for an appeal to the President.

The Board confirmed board members for previously authorized charter schools. Two reappointments were approved to the Michigan Health Academy and one to the Lake Bluff Academy. A new board member was appointed to the Sunrise Educational Center.

The Board granted emeriti status to two retired faculty members, one retired staff member and one retiring staff member. Emeritus status was granted to Professor John A. Clinkenbeard, who had been a founding member of SVSU's accounting department and with

the University since 1969. Frederick A. Webster III, a retired member of the management and marketing department, was granted emeritus status for his years of services from 1977 to 1987. Larry Fitzpatrick, retiring director of human resources, was honored for his more than 21 years of services to SVSU. In addition, Marilyn Frahm, retired director of information services, was granted emerita status for her service to SVSU since 1976.

William R. Bowen was appointed a new member to the SVSU Board of Fellows by the Board of Control. Emeritus status was granted to Bert W. Baker. Also, George F. Ditzhazy and Richard A. Lounsbery were reappointed to the Board of Fellows.

The awarding of master's degrees in business administration was approved for 16 students in the International M.B.A. Program. The 16 students from Taiwan received their diplomas in a ceremony on Aug. 14.

The Board approved the hiring of 10 faculty members for the 1997-98 academic year — seven of them filling newly-created positions. Six new Administrative/Professional staff members also were named, including two in new positions and one as the Harvey Randall Wickes Endowed Chair in International Business.

The Board authorized an increased expenditure of up to \$75,000 for the replacement of roofs on four University buildings. Complications caused the total cost to exceed the \$325,000 approved by the Board during its June meeting.

The Board also approved a charter for a school in Buena Vista Township. Mosaica Academy of Saginaw is hoping to open in September.
