SVSU alumni show support for Campaign for Distinction

number of SVSU alumni have united in a show of support for future SVSU students, resulting in the creation of the Dow Corning Employees Scholarship Fund, the Alumni Endowed M.B.A. Scholarship and the Bob Becker Endowed Scholarship. Those three, plus enhancement of the Alumni Endowed Scholarship, are the result of efforts by alumni for The Campaign for Distinction.

The Dow Corning Employees Scholarship Fund was established by alumni employed by the Dow Corning Corp. The award recognizes superior academic performance of students majoring in either science or business. Grants will be made to full- or part-time students enrolled in a program leading to a degree in business, engineering or the sciences, and who are at least sophomores. Junior and senior students also may be considered. The recipients must have a minimum GPA of 3.20, exemplify leadership ability and character. Financial need also may be considered. Students may continue to receive the scholarship through graduation, provided they meet all criteria.

The Alumni Endowed M.B.A. Scholarship was designed to assist current M.B.A. students in getting their degrees. Several contributions were received from local businesses and graduates of SVSU's M.B.A. program. Grants will be made to full- or part-time students enrolled in the M.B.A. program. The recipient must not be employed by a company with a tuition reimbursement program. Recipients must have completed at least 12 hours and be in good standing within the M.B.A. program. Financial need will be considered. Recipients must be residents of the mid-Michigan area and have exhibited desirable qualities of leadership and character. The scholarship may be renewable if the recipient continues to meet the criteria.

The Alumni Association established the Alumni Endowed Scholarship to recognize students who have shown scholastic achievement in their chosen fields. The purpose of the endowment is to recognize and encourage continued progress. Grants will be made to full-time students who are juniors or seniors. They must have a minimum GPA of 3.00, display potential for leadership and quality of character. Financial need may be considered. The Campaign for Distinction generated an additional \$7,000 toward the scholarship, which now has more than \$35,000 in endowed funds.

The Board of Directors of the SVSU Alumni Association established the Bob Becker Endowed Scholarship to recognize the contributions of Becker, SVSU's athletic director since 1980. Funds for the scholarship were provided by individual gifts from both SVSU alumni and employees, as well as proceeds from the Bob Becker Open, a golf outing developed for this purpose. The scholarship provides financial assistance to exceptional female athletes who participate in sports other than basketball. The award annually will be rotated among eligible athletic programs. Grants will be made to full-time students who are at least sophomores and have a GPA of at least 3.00. The recipient also must exhibit desirable qualities of character and leadership. Candidates will be nominated by their coaches.

Kathryn Curtiss Spence, director of the Alumni Association and associate development officer, said she is pleased to see the level of commitment displayed by SVSU alumni for the benefit of future students.

"It's exciting to see this level of financial commitment shown by the alums," Spence said. "The interest the Campaign has generated from alumni is proof they value their education and want to see others succeed, as well."



Unique agreement offers choices for students

SVSU and Michigan State University signed a unique agreement in March — the first of its kind for either institution. The March 26 event with the two universities marks the first time either school has signed an articulation agreement with another four-year institution.

The signing, which took place at SVSU, will allow SVSU students to transfer to one of 27 majors within MSU's College of Agriculture and Natural Resources with full transfer credit and student standing at MSU.

For example, a student could attend SVSU for one or two years and then transfer to MSU

with 30 or 60 transfer credits and begin their agriculture-related major as a sophomore or junior.

Eric Gilbertson, SVSU president, and Richard Brandenburg, MSU associate dean of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, announced the articulation agreement at a March 26 meeting at SVSU.

"This gives students choices," President Eric Gilbertson said, adding, "this would give SVSU students a chance to pursue the superb agricultural programs at MSU."

Gilbertson credited Alan "Zinger" Reisenger with planting the seed for the program.

"A skilled person on our maintenance crew, Zinger also is involved with youth in agricultural programs. He met with me and explained how many youth would like to remain part of the family farming business, but may not be ready to leave home, or may not have the money." This agreement, Gilbertson said, would help the students begin developing their career goals at SVSU before transferring.

MSU's director of Admissions and Scholarships, William Turner, said MSU was "used to building relationships with two-year schools. It's unusual to collaborate at this level with a sister institution.

"But when you step back," Turner continued, "it makes a lot of sense. This is a melding of a lot of obvious things."

Richard Brandenburg, MSU associate dean of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, agreed.

"This is a good first step," Brandenburg said. "We should be creative in how we amplify that."

Wynn McDonald, coordinator of transfer student programs and services, coordinated the articulation agreement with MSU and SVSU officials.
