#### Law memorial fund assists engineering and business majors

scholarship fund for business and engineering students received a tremendous boost during the Campaign for Distinction. The Don C. Law Memorial Scholarship initially was established in 1986 and received significant enhancements during the campaign with very generous commitments from both Magline Inc., and D. Brian and Trish Law. With the additional funding, the Don C. Law Memorial Scholarship Fund has become one of the largest private scholarship funds within the SVSU Foundation.

The scholarship was established by the board of directors of Magline Inc., in

honor of Don Law, company founder. Law was board chair and president at the time of his death in 1985. Law was an aeronautical engineer and business entrepreneur. While he was a strong leader and lifetime learner, he also was described as a very humble and modest man.

Magline, a Pinconning company,

attributes much of its growth to Law's leadership. The scholarship fund was established to recognize and perpetuate Law's commitment to the full development of individual potential.

The Don C. Law Memorial Scholarship recognizes scholastic achievement, encourages continued progress and provides financial assistance to business and engineering students.

"It represents his commitment to education, his enthusiasm for the growth of SVSU and it contributes to the strength of our region and the personal joy he always felt in helping others reach their personal goals," said D. Brian Law, Don Law's son and Magline president, chair and CEO. "As a reflection of their friendship with Don and their appreciation for his personal, professional and community legacy, the people at Magline are very proud to sponsor this scholarship."

Grants are made to full- or part-time students enrolled in an academic program leading to a degree in the colleges of Business and Management or Science, Engineering and Technology. Financial need is not a

factor.

Recipients are selected on the basis of scholastic achievement and/or desirable qualities of character and leadership. Students must maintain a minimum 3.00 grade point average to receive and retain the scholarship award.

The faculties of the two colleges nominate recipients. Employees of Magline Inc., their

spouses and children may be given consideration as nominees for scholarship awards. Awards will be made for up to one-half of the student's required tuition and fee charges.

As a testament to Magline's commitment to SVSU, Brian Law is a member of SVSU's Board of Control and two alumni are vice presidents of the company. Bruce Law, an M.B.A. graduate, is Magline's vice president for international business development. Mike Kirby received a B.B.A. in accounting and is Magline's vice president of marketing.



#### Health care seminar to identify disease detectives

A seminar designed for health care professionals seeks to take the mystery and confusion out of human disease. The seminar is offered in two sessions: 8 a.m. to noon, and 5:30 to 9 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 23 at the Tuscola Technology Center in Caro.

The seminar will be lead by Ralph Cook, MD, MPH, president and senior consultant of RRC Consulting, LLC. Cook is a former corporate director of epidemiology for Dow Corning Corp.


During the seminar, Cook will identify the five principles of epidemiology and their impact on epidemiological studies; discuss using the five principles to evaluate the merit and validity of scientific literature and identify key aspects of the silicone breast implant controversy. Epidemiology is the study of the distribution and determinants of human disease.




#### **Professional Profile**
