onitor Sugar Co. and its growers introduced a scholarship opportunity during The Campaign for Distinction. The "Big Chief" endowed scholarship will assist incoming students pursuing degrees in the colleges of Business & Management, or Science, Engineering & Technology.

One full-time freshman student annually will receive scholarship funds to cover tuition for one year. The recipient must have a minimum high school grade point average of 3.50. Transfer students must have a collegiate minimum 3.40 GPA. Recipients must reside in the 15 county regional area in which growers are located.

"Both Monitor Sugar Co. and its growers are committed to this regional community and desire to assist in providing higher education opportunities for its residents by establishing the Monitor 'Big Chief' Scholarship Endowment Fund," according to Robert L. Hetzler, CEO of Monitor Sugar Co. "Distributions from the fund will provide 'Big Chief' Scholarships for both current and future generations of outstanding area students, thus recognizing scholastic achievement and encouraging continued progress by providing assistance to students in financing their education at Saginaw Valley State University."

Monitor Sugar Co. was built in 1901 under the name "German-American Farmers Cooperative Beet Sugar Co." Since then, it has grown and expanded through the talents and energy of its past and present employees and its growers. With a renewed commitment to the community and the environment, Monitor Sugar Co. is prepared for the future, Hetzler said.

Today, Monitor Sugar Co., producer and processor of "Big Chief" sugar products, is headquartered in Bay City and continues to produce "Big Chief" brand sugars, pulp and


molasses. Currently, more than 775 area growers from 15 counties plant and grow sugar beets for Monitor.

• Alfred Bracciano, professor of occupational therapy, presented a full-day workshop at the Michigan Occupational Therapy Association Annual Fall Conference, Sept. 24 in East Lansing. "Superficial Thermal Agents and Therapeutic Ultrasound" addressed the indications and contraindications of thermal agents in the rehabilitation process and their impact on wound healing. Bracciano was assisted by adjunct faculty member Don Early. Bracciano also received a Michigan Occupational Therapy Association Service Award for his tenure as the academic chair on the MOTA Council on Education.

Bracciano also will have a paper published in the January 1999 issue of the Occupational Therapy Practice Journal. "Therapeutic Ultrasound, Indications and Applications for the Occupational Therapist" was accepted for publication in October 1998.

Bracciano also co-authored a short course that was accepted for presentation at the 1999 American Occupational Therapy Association Annual conference and Exposition, April 20 in Indianapolis. "Treating Shoulder Impingement Syndrome: Adapting, Managing and Remediating dysfunction" will be presented with Early.


- The campus community extends condolences to Mohamed El-Kasabi, professor of electrical and computer engineering, whose mother recently passed away.



Melvin J. Zahnow

Sept. 21, 1911 Oct. 7, 1998 Melvin J. Zahnow, one of SVSU's original incorporators and a long-time trustee, passed away Wednesday, Oct. 7, 1998. SVSU's library is named for Mr. Zahnow, and he was the sole contributor to a new amphitheatre that is named for his wife, Lillian. The University will open the amphitheatre in the spring.

A Frankenmuth resident, Mr. Zahnow was chairman and trustee of Wickes Corporation, and was a former chairman of the Harvey Randall Wickes Foundation. He began his business career as secretary and director of Wickes Brothers and Wickes Boiler Company in 1940. He also was a member of the SVSU Board of Control and the SVSU Foundation.

Mr. Zahnow earned his bachelor of arts in business administration from Albion College in 1934. In recognition of his contribution to SVSU, the University bestowed an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree upon Mr. Zahnow in 1982 and a Distinguished Service Medallion in 1991.

The former Saginaw business and civic leader is remembered for his involvement in numerous clubs and organizations. In 1985, the Saginaw Chamber of Commerce honored him with its Community Service Award. Mr. Zahnow also was the recipient of the Lutheran Social Services Distinguished Service Award and is listed in *Who's Who in the Midwest*.
