## U.S. Department of Education awards \$9 million grant to SUSU

The U.S. Department of Education
Tuesday, Sept. 7 announced the awarding of a grant totaling nearly \$9 million
to SVSU toward the development of a
Partnership Grant for Improving Teacher
Quality. The grant provides funding of more
than \$1.79 million per year for five years, commencing Oct. 1. SVSU is the only university in
Michigan to receive the grant and one of only
25 in the country.

"This is the largest, most important federal grant in our history," said President Eric R. Gilbertson when notified.

The project is designed and governed through collaboration with the colleges of Arts and Behavioral Sciences, Education, and Science, Engineering and Technology; 15 regional intermediate school districts and 12 chartered schools to directly impact approximately 1,200 University pre-service teachers, 47,000 current teachers and 366,000 students in partner high-need schools in 147 school districts.

"We are really excited about the opportunity for SVSU faculty members in the three colleges to work closely with K-12 teachers," said Robert S.P. Yien, vice president for academic affairs. "The grant came as a result of the hard work of more than 20 people."

Marianne Barnett, acting assistant dean of the College of Arts and Behavioral Sciences, developed the grant proposal with input from the faculty and deans of the three colleges, Cheryl Easley, dean of the Crystal M. Lange College of Nursing and Health Sciences, and Diane Boehm, director of the University Writing Program. Barbara Beck, administrative secretary in the Office of Sponsored Programs and Faculty Development, also was a team player, according to Barnett.

The federal funding will assist in revamping teacher preparation to meet these needs and develop five major innovations through partnership collaboration: (1) new University course models and K-12 subject area unit models with application materials and resources in core content, for use within the teacher preparation program and K-12 classroom; (2) new in-service models with application materials and resources in core subject areas for K-12 schools, especially in reading/writing, mathematics and sciences; (3) workshop models, sustained mentoring, and support resources for new teacher development; (4) action-oriented leadership institute models for K-12 teacherleaders and administrators; and (5) an alternative University process for teacher certification.

The grant proposal took approximately six weeks to prepare, Barnett said, and SVSU's was one of 250 sent to the U.S. Department of Education.

## SVSU sets another enrollment record

SVSU reported its largest fall enrollment, with 8,383 students – up 4.08 percent above 1998's total of 8,054. The fall 1999 total includes SVSU's largest freshman class: 1,070, an increase of 11.2 percent above 1998's freshman class of 962.

The University also saw an 11.8 percent increase in the number of students in graduate-level courses.

Enrollment for fall semester includes 55 Presidential Scholarship recipients (from 28 in 1998 for a nearly 80 percent increase). Presidential Scholarship recipients must be their high school valedictorian or salutatorian.

Thirty percent of enrolled freshmen have a high school grade point average of 3.5 and above, an increase of 24 percent (from 259 to 321).

This year, SVSU also has seen an increase in the number of freshmen living in residential housing. Those using on-campus housing has increased from 299 in 1998 to 475 this fall.

# Parking, safety focus of Public Safety efforts

The Department of Public Safety is busy improving awareness of campus safety and parking.

## Parking services

The Parking Services Office is located inside the Department of Public Safety on Pierce Road next to the Observatory. All parking at SVSU is controlled by signage. Several free parking lots are located throughout the campus, although a permit always is required to park overnight.

Parking rules on campus were established by the SVSU Board of Control through enactment of the SVSU Parking, Traffic and Pedestrian Ordinance. The Board set fines for various parking offenses and delegated judicial oversight for the Ordinance to the 70th District Court of Saginaw County.

Those who wish to appeal parking tickets may do so by completing an appeal form, available from Parking Services. The form is sent to the 70th District Court for adjudication. Parking citations that are not paid or appealed through Parking Services within 14 days of issuance are sent directly to the 70th District Court for adjudication. Once the Court receives a ticket (through appeal or from SVSU) all decisions regarding the outcome of the ticket are at the discretion of the Court.

Questions regarding unique parking needs should be directed to Joyce Payne at ext. 4140 during business hours, or ext. 4141 in the evening until midnight. Parking Services will try to accommodate all special requests for parking, but asks that these requests be made in a timely manner.

Parking Services also offers the Motorist Assist Program, which includes assistance to those needing battery jumps, vehicle unlocks and gasoline. There is no charge for this service. Please call ext. 4141 for assistance.

#### Police services on campus

The SVSU Department of Public Safety employs seven full-time and three part-time police officers who utilize a community-based approach to policing.

Emergency calls for service should be directed to Saginaw Central Dispatch at 9-911 (from on campus), 911 (from off-campus). Central Dispatch coordinates emergency calls for police, fire, and medical services throughout Saginaw County. The Department of Public Safety can be contacted directly at ext. 4141, or 790-4141 from off-campus. The campus

community is encouraged to use Public Safety's direct number for any communication not involving an immediate emergency. Public Safety's phone generally is answered from 8 a.m. to midnight, Monday through Friday, and from 6 p.m. to midnight on Saturday and Sunday, with some exceptions during holidays and other times when the University is closed.

#### Crime on campus

The Annual Crime Awareness Report, 1999, now is available for the campus community. The report can be reviewed on-line at www.svsu.edu/publicsafety. Printed copies of the report are available by calling ext. 4141. SVSU experiences a very low rate of crime, with incidents of violent crime being very rare. Most reported crime involves theft or vandalism. For more information, call ext. 4141.

### Traffic safety campaign begins

Public Safety will conduct a traffic safety campaign from Sept. 14 through 31. The goal of this campaign is to focus attention on vehicle and pedestrian safety in a positive manner.

University Police will focus on three types of traffic violations: 1) speeding, 2) stop sign violations, and 3) failure to stop for pedestrians in crosswalks. These three violations present the greatest danger to pedestrians and other motorists on campus. University Police will stop and ticket drivers for these violations.

Public Safety will aggressively enforce these three violations during the traffic safety campaign; however, warning citations will be issued during the September campaign in an effort to remind motorists to obey traffic regulations on campus.

## Lyric mezzo-soprano opens 1999-00 Rhea Miller Concert Series

Katherine Kelton, lyric mezzo-soprano, opens the Rhea Miller Concert Series at 7:30 p.m., Saturday, Sept. 25. Kelton's concert will be in the Rhea Miller Recital Hall. There is no admission charge.

Kelton maintains an active career in which she performs an eclectic range of music including chant, opera, jazz and new compositions.

## SVSU names Alumni Relations director

Matthew F. Hufnagel was named director of Alumni Relations and associate development officer, replacing Kathryn Curtiss Spence who had been in the position since 1996.

## SUSU nets support for native plants

SVSU recently received a \$10,000 grant to install native plants of local provenance on the main campus. The funding is through the Saginaw Bay Watershed Initiative Network (WIN) and Sustainable Communities Initiative Fund of the Bay Area Communities Foundation. In addition, the United State Fish & Wildlife Service is providing several services to support the creation of the site.

The plants will be found in the north-central area of campus along College Drive West, south of Pine Grove Apartments and west of Founders Hall.

According to Steve Hocquard, director of engineering services, the plants were native to this area before the 1850s. Some of the plants remain in the area, but are not as prevalent.

"This is a demonstration area in order to help promote the use of native planting," Hocquard said. "These plants need less maintenance, are resistant to most insects and diseases in this locality and they grow better without additional water and fertilizer."

He added that the site will not only be available for people to view the planting, but seeds may be gathered for further propagation.

According to Hocquard, "local provenance" indicates the seeds for the plants were gathered from within 100 miles north or south of the university campus.

WIN is a volunteer organization that includes more than 90 citizens and organizations and focuses on opportunities to better link the economic, social and environmental wellbeing of Saginaw Bay communities in order to sustain and improve the region's quality of life.

The exhibit, by El Centro Mexicano de Michigan, features photos taken by Cassasola, a company dedicated to preserving historic pictures of Mexico. The photos will be on display the week of Oct. 11.
