

Social Workers in SW 551 Get Close and Personal to Urban Life

Dr. Giesler oversees a fieldtrip to Detroit and Saginaw to supplement their learning. Students paired up to conduct preliminary research on five agencies that employ social workers—three in Detroit and two in Saginaw. After a tour of each facility, they interviewed staff about their roles. The trip to Detroit was complemented by a tour of the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History. Mark Giesler said, "I was proud that my students endured the cold and wintry day to get a firsthand look at the strengths and challenges of urban agencies. They represented SVSU well with their positive attitudes and professional demeanor."

Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT)

The Rural Center for Rural Behavioral Health and Addiction Studies has been working to help students and community partners learn to do Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT). Through a three-step scaffolding approach, students and professionals have become more confident, competent, and ready to help treat people living with substance use and mental health disorders by identifying the issues, intervening and have the resources to refer them to a proper treatment provider. Participants in the SBIRT training complete an online, self-paced, didactic training explaining SBIRT and viewing a video of how SBIRT could look. Once the didactic training is completed, participants engage in a virtual simulation in a gaming environment, using a product called Kognito, to safely practice the new skills that were learned through the didactic training. Following the didactic training, participants engage in a interdisciplinary live simulation experience.

Through the MI Babies, a grant-funded project led by Project Director, Kimberly Martini-Toth, 72 professionals employed by Central Michigan District Health Department completed SBIRT training from November 28 – 30, 2022. These professionals held various roles at the Health Department. Everyone from front desk clerks to Nurse Practitioners were trained and participated in the live simulation. The staff were very thankful to have the training with one staff member sharing, "*Our staff here at CMDHD have to learn how to ask the tough questions. If we don't, we will never be able to help these families. We have to learn how to ask the tough questions and welcome everyone without any judgement. This is what gains the trust from our community. This is how we change the community and the future. This training was probably the best yet!"*


On December 9 – 10, 2022 there were 55 students who were trained in the SVSU simulation laboratory. These students were currently enrolled in SVSU's Family Nurse Practitioner Program, Social Work program (both BSW & MSW), and Occupational Therapy program. The students participated in three rounds of simulations throughout the day. During lunch, Narcan training was done and Narcan kits were distributed to any participant who was interested in taking one. The Narcan kits were provided by Recovery Pathways, a community partner.

The Center for Rural Behavioral Health and Addiction Studies staff would like to thank the Simulation Laboratory Staff for their help in completing yet another very successful weekend of SBIRT simulations. The Center for Rural Behavioral Health and Addiction Studies Staff would also like to thank the faculty who took time out of their weekend to come and do evaluations for the simulations as well as to Anthony for all of his help with copying and preparing documents for the simulations. Together we are taking the steps necessary to address Substance Use and Mental Health Disorders in rural Michigan!

Project ECHO at SVSU awarded "Superhub" Status

The Center for Rural Behavioral Health and Addiction Studies became a Project ECHO Superhub, joining the ranks of only 25 organizations with the designation worldwide. As a Superhub, SVSU is authorized to train new ECHO partners (called "hubs") and provide technical assistance and support as they grow their programs.

<u>Project ECHO</u>, a global nonprofit organization headquartered at The University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center, uses a revolutionary guided-practice model that reduces health and education disparities in underserved and rural areas around the world. ECHO "hubs" are sites that facilitate ECHO programs. "Superhubs" are sites that are authorized to train even more hubs, accelerating the spread of specialized knowledge at an exponential rate. They are vetted, have a high degree of fidelity to the ECHO model, and have the teaching capability and expertise to provide quality, immersive training, and continuous mentorship.

"Project ECHO has allowed us to address the dearth of substance use disorder providers in rural communities to contribute to ending the disparity in treatment access in rural communities. As we work to develop additional hub teams we build capacity to improve access to care." Indicated Trisha Charbonneau-Ivey, Associate Director of the Center for Rural Behavioral Health & Addiction Studies and Project ECHO Superhub Director. "Our SVSU Center for Rural Behavioral Health & Addiction Studies team has embraced the opportunity to play this critical role in the ECHO movement as we work together to touch one billion lives by 2025."

Project ECHO offers the opportunity to obtain Continuing Medical Education credits (CME), Social Work Continuing Education credits (SWCE), and Substance Use Disorder continuing education hours for each session.

Dr. Kathleen Schachman, HR Wickes Endowed Professor of Nursing, Project Director and Director of the Center shares, "SVSU and the Center for Rural Behavioral Health & Addiction Studies deeply values the relationship with the ECHO Institute and is proud to serve as an ECHO Superhub. We are honored have the opportunity to build capacity in continuing education across Michigan and beyond."

About Project ECHO at SVSU

SVSU first introduced Project ECHO for Substance Use Disorders in October of 2018. Through our team of experts, we have provided tele-mentoring to over 850 health care professionals in 78 Michigan counties and across 43 states in the United States. SVSU's Substance Use Disorder (SUD) ECHO and the Perinatal Substance Use Disorder (P-SUD) ECHO, bring together healthcare workers and providers seeking guidance from our interdisciplinary team of experts on the most pressing issues and difficult cases. This team leverages the expertise of an Addictionologist, a Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner, a master's level social worker specializing in Perinatal Substance Use Disorder, a pharmacist, and a peer recovery coach providing the perspective of lived experience. Our Project ECHO sessions utilize teleconferencing technology to provide easy access to cutting edge information and interactive case-based learning for any healthcare provider, mental health or substance use disorder professional, social worker, peer recovery specialist, administrator, or student with interest in substance use disorder prevention, treatment, and recovery.
