

What is STUDIO XP? STUDIO XP is a production program affording undergraduate, theatre alumni, and faculty directors the opportunity to direct works beyond limitations of classroom presentations.

Staging a full-length play in this manner tasks the director with penetrating the work and the technical liaison with preparing a production plan that translates the playwright's vision from page to stage.

Most vital of all in StudioXP is the creative interface among students. At the very heart of the production should be the peer's work with the comprehension, communication, time, energy, and ensemble artistry essential to the full realization of a work.

Although two faculty members mentor the student director and technical liaison, STUDIO XP is student driven which deepens the experiential learning of this process. Except for Jerry Dennis, our staff Scenic Designer and Technial Director, every thing you see on this stage has been created by students. From the lights and sound, the costumes and makeup, to the acting and staging choices: students led the way. This stands as a testament to the strength, artistry, and dedication of the students in our SVSU Theatre program.

STUDIO XP shows are typically featured in our intimate Black Box Theatre, but in order to facilitate audience social distancing, Lonely Planet is presented to you live in our larger mainstage space: The Malcolm Field Theatre for the Performing Arts.

A Note from the Director -

"We will leave some traces, for we are people and not cities."

The above quote, said by Carl in the final scene of *Lonely Planet*, is originally from *The Chairs* by Eugène Ionesco, a Romanian-French playwright and one of the founders of "The Theatre of the Absurd," a movement created in response to World War II. A main idea of absurdist theatre was the belief that man's condition in the universe was illogical—beyond human rationality—and therefore, meaningless. Only by committing oneself to a greater good, they thought, could a life have any meaning. To many artists, artists like us in SVSU's theatre program, the "good" we commit ourselves to is that of performance and creation, despite the vulnerability it takes to share what you've made. That is where *Lonely Planet* comes in.

My goal in directing this piece was to remind those involved in the process: the design team, cast, and most importantly, the audience, to view the inevitable tragedies of life through a practical lens in order to better grasp the intangible things we leave behind when pass on; the traces of ourselves that get remembered by our loved ones. *Lonely Planet* is all about these traces. The reward of good art and of challenging what one's own traces will be is what *Lonely Planet* poses to the audience: what will you choose to leave behind?

When I originally applied for Studio XP last winter, I was under the impression that it was going to be a "simple" three-night run in our Black Box Theatre rather than a five-night run here on the mainstage. Boy, was I in for a surprise. With that in mind, the theatre faculty at SVSU have always held me to such high expectations, expectations that have made me a more well-rounded, stronger, and creative theatremaker. With their full confidence, I jumped into the process of *Lonely Planet*, sweaty palms be damned, because I knew if they were willing to entrust this tremendous project to me, I must have been deserving and ready to handle it...nerves aside.

Lonely Planet is a story of tragedy and loss, but also one of love and friendship, specifically between two LGBTQIA+ people. Queer stories have been historically swept under the rug, especially those that were present during the crisis that was the HIV/AIDS epidemic in the early 1980s. In my experience as a queer woman, the erasure of our stories stems from heteronormative ideology and how the youth of today are improperly exposed to same-sex couples or same-sex education in society through biased media outlets and skewed politicalization of queer existence.

Acknowledging, also, that the HIV/AIDS epidemic is a reflection of what society is currently facing through COVID-19, this story is a timely one. Seeing as in a time where touching is not encouraged, agoraphobic anxieties are not something we are unfamiliar with.

Lonely Planet focuses on connection without touching, knowledge without speaking, and faith without fear. When times are especially hard, we turn to our friends, we turn to our families, for hope. Hope, in the darkest of times, is not lost. That is what Lonely Planet represents.

Thank you, and welcome to Jody's Maps. We are so happy to have you here.

A Note from the Dramaturg -

The Center for Disease Control first encountered AIDS in 1981, when researchers at the National Cancer Institute named the disease "Gay-Related Immune Difficency" (GRID). The CDC first coined the name acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) in 1982 when the organization discovered the disease can be transmitted to heterosexual people. In 1983 the National Cancer Institute published a report naming human immunodeficiency viruses (HIV) as the cause of AIDS. In 1985 the first blood test for HIV/AIDS was developed by Abbot and used in hospitals nationwide. Azidothymidine (AZT), a potent drug for AIDS patients, was not approved until 1989. AZT is able to treat HIV and prevent the disease from progressing into AIDS. Today, there are approximately 1.2 million people in the United States living with HIV, and more than 35,000 new cases of HIV have been reported annually in the United States since 1981. The United States Department of Health and Human Services announced a plan in 2020 to use medications such as AZT, early diagnosis, and rapid treatment to reduce the number of new HIV infections in the United States by 75% by 2025 and 90% by 2030.

Steven Dietz was inspired to write *Lonely Planet* from his own experience during the AIDS crisis. Dietz states in an interview, "The emotional side is I was losing friends in our field, and a good college friend. My experience was really in the theatre community. I'm a straight man, I'm not a gay man, but I had teachers who would be sick, and colleagues".

Lonely Planet explores themes surrounding friendship, mourning, and the fear of being forgotten. The play first premiered in Evanston, Illinois in 1993 at Northlight Theater. Dietz continues to work as a playwright, director, and professor at the University of Texas at Austin. He was named one of the Top 20 Most-Produced Playwrights in 2019 by American Theatre, a publication of theatre communications group.

In *Lonely Planet*, Carl manifests the pain he feels from losing his friends by placing their empty chairs in Jody's map store. Jody is bothered by the physical space Carl's mourning is taking up in his shop, and Carl is consumed by the space his mourning is taking up in his mind. The symbolism of chairs is a reference to a play titled *The Chairs* (1952) by Eugene Ionesco. In it, an elderly couple sets up chairs for invisible people so that they may hear the Old Man's message to the world before he dies. *The Chairs*, like *Lonely Planet*, explores the futility and loneliness of human existence. *Lonely Planet*, however, offers a glimmer of hope that can be found when we make the choice to live fearlessly.

Sometimes the problems we see in our world today seem too massive or too daunting for us to overcome, so we shut ourselves inside our own "map stores" and search for a precise path to clarity. We need people like Carl who are not afraid to engage with all the messiness and hopelessness in the world. We need people to leave their kindness, their ingenuity, and their sense of humor wherever they go. We need you, in all of your messy, imperfect, undeniable goodness. The world needs you.

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Kennedy Center education and related artistic programming is made possible through the generosity of the National Committee for the Performing Arts.

This production is entered in the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF). The aims of this national theater education program are to identify and promote quality in college-level theater production. To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
