

# A Note from the Director

This is how I got the idea for *Very Berry Dead*: during a socially-distanced lunch, one of my coworkers told me the most fascinating thing. The farm she grew up on in Ohio, they have a family cemetery where everyone gets buried when they pass. Whenever it is time to bury someone, a person from the county needs to come out to approve. A cousin of hers had just died, and none of the family liked this cousin. Her dad technically had veto powers, and he had denied a deceased a spot in the cemetery before. Now the family was debating: is it veto time again?

I immediately knew there was a play in there and I bombarded my coworker with questions over her salad. I told my editor/dramaturg, Taylor Couch, every detail and we immediately scheduled a Writers Room day to develop the outline for a first draft. By the way, Taylor directed the first staged reading of the play (I played J.J.), she has edited so many of my scripts, and is a co-founder of our company, Big Storm Performance Company. Theatre gets made within a community of committed artists and weird friends who spend hours thinking of berry puns.

Very Berry Dead is my favorite play I've written to date. It was the smoothest first draft of my life, taking only a week and a half. I write my scripts in the same cafe in Pittsburgh. I have laughed out loud and cried there so many times while working through these characters' stories. I often wonder what the staff think of me.

I grew up in Saginaw and it's where I fell in love with theatre; one original show at The 303 in Old Town did it for me. It feels appropriate that I'd come back to direct a show about returning home.

There might be some ideas in this show that don't sit well with you. I would ask that you just listen through to the end, and perhaps just for these couple of hours not outright dismiss these ideas. I'm trying to present some nuanced situations that don't always fit together or resolve nice and neat. That feels more like real life to me.

Eternal gratitude to the faculty and staff of this Theatre Department. Especially grateful to my colleague and stage combat "fight friend", Professor Tommy Wedge, who was integral in bringing me in as a guest director. This program took a chance on a new play and a new director. These are the kind of opportunities that artists making original work need to see their scrappy new plays have life and not just live in their head.



This production is entered in the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF). The aims of this national theater education program are to identify and promote quality in college-level theater production. To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
